Vouchers:

On motion by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried vouchers were approved for payment in the amount of \$2,166.01.

Police: Report The Police Report for the month of November, 1970 was reviewed. On motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair, the report was accepted. Highlights of the report revealed that fines and bail forfeitures for motor vehicle and criminal offenses amounted to \$335.00. Of the 45 motor vehicle arrests, 26 were for speeding, and of the 21 criminal matters, 5 were charged with criminal possession of a dangerous drug and 5 with criminal possession of a dangerous instrument.

Bids for Loader REJECTED:

The following motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Mierke and carried:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the bids submitted on November 25, 1970 for a loader to replace the Trojan Payloader be and hereby are all rejected.

Replace : Sewer Bed Roof The following motion was made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra accept the bid of Roche Kimberly Construction Co., Palmyra, New York, in the amount of \$4,850.00 as submitted on October 26, 1970 for the replacement of the designated area of the roof torn from the rafters by the tornado storm which devastated areas of the village on August 30, 1970. Insurance adjustments will allow \$4,750.00.

Weykman Bldg.: The following motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried:RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra instruct the village highway crews to knock out and board up the broken windows and open spaces in the Weykman Bldg. at 305 East Main Street in that at the present time while a notice was placed on this building as UNSAFE, the would-be owners are reluctant to reveal themselves. Therefore, for the safety of pedestrians and temptation for vandalism, it is deemed the perogative of this board to assume the responsibility of closing in the building until such time when demolition may be accomplished.

Comm. Ctr.:

Two young boys, one a Boland, asked the board if it would be possible to have the Community Center open on Monday and Tuesday nights in that they did not have any place or anything to do on these nights. Board informed them that they would discuss the matter with the Community Center Director.

Town : Discusses Water Tony Malone of Hershey, Malone, Rochester, New York, Engineers and Raymond LeRoy, Councilman of the Town of Palmyra aired their views on the possibility of a new water line from the west by way of a connection with the Town of Macedon on the north of the Canal. Actually, water would be received from Macedon Center.

In summation, a possible method would be to have a meter on Division Street, which should the need arise, could be turned on to allow water to flow into the Village of Palmyra. Moreover, it was the thought of the Town Board that a water line be extended from Stafford Street south to include Stafford Road to the county line. The Town of Palmyra would finance the installation of the line which the Village could then charge for water usage. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that while Stafford Road would receive water, it still would not be annexed to the Village of Palmyra. Mr. Malone commented that this would be a matter for the 2 political subdivisions, the Town and Village, to resolve. In his opinion, he commented, that it would be beneficial to both to agree to follow the suggestions provided. Annexation would entail a majority of land owners in the area.

December 7, 1710 Warner Strong, West Jackson Street, and a member of the Jaycees, asked the board to give him an estimate of the footage of the present village hall, including the housing of the fire trucks. W.Strong Request: His group is working on a proposal of combining a municipal building with a community center and housing for fire trucks. Clerk was asked to obtain such an estimated figure.

New Fire Dept. Members:

On recommendation of the Board of Fire Commissioners, the on recommendation of the Board of Fire Commissioners, the following were approved for membership in the department on motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried: Adrian Francis Fortuna, R.D. 2A, Palmyra, New York (Marquart Adrian Camp) and Peter D. Weston, 69 Maple Ave., Palmyra, N.Y. pending completion of the training required by the Fire Department.

Reduce Drury Sewer:

Walter Drury, 501 East Main Street, had written a letter to the village requesting reduction in his sewer since his house is no longer a two family home. The water cashier reviewed the records which revealed that the water consumption even in the present quarter is over 4,000 cu. ft. Therefore, the sewer present only be reduced to \$21,60/quarter as against the present quarter is over 4,000 cu. It. Therefore, the sewer rate can only be reduced to \$21.60/quarter as against the previous rate of \$34.56. Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried to reduce the rate to \$21.60 beginning with the December 1, 1970 billing.

Lights in Park: Clerk had contacted the N.Y.S. Elec. & Gas for suggestion from them to adequately light the village park, especially in the north back area. A suggested plan of 4 lights, such as are placed on village streets was presented for an annual cost of \$220.00 to become a part of the street lighting contract. board agreed this would be an excellent plan with the addition of comparable lights in the area of the bandstand. Clerk was asked to so inform the Gas & Electric company for an additional figure.

Sale of : Fire Dept. "Grasshopper"

Anson Johnson, Jr., West Main Street, had indicated that he would like to purchase the outmoded fire department "grass-hopper" for his personal use and would offer the village the amount of \$100.00. Motion by Trustee Warner, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried.

8 Day Nite:

The group which have called themselves "8 Day-Nite" had approached John Lagana, owner of the bowling alley at 108 Cuyler for permission to use the basement of his building which had previously been a "Teen Center", nearly 10 yrs. ago. On the suggestion of the Village Board, Fire Chief James C. O'Brien was asked to inspect the spot for fire safety. A letter was received from Fire Chief O'Brien which indicated that exits were not adequate and if there were to be cooking facilities, exhaust fans should be provided. (H.B. Nesbitt, Attorney, took the letter for reference.)

Exam. for Comm.Ctr. Director

Civil Serv.: The clerk advised that a call had been received from the Lyons Exam. for office of the N.Y.S. Civil Service informing the village that inasmuch as there was a full time director of the community center, it would be necessary for him to take a Civil Service examination in February, 1971. James Cunningham, of the Community Center Board, will advise the salary range for publication.

W. Roche Re; U.D.C. William Roche, Urban Renewal Director informed the Village Board that the Urban Development Corporation is making a study on the county level in order to speed up work in several communities in the county. The Wayne Economic several communities in the county. Development Corporation has been designated as the spot to funnel all material. The Urban Development Corporation are active but cautious in developing. They were pleasantly surprised to learn that the Village of Palmyra was involved in the Urban Renewal Program and indicated they would be interested in assisting to put the plan in action. They indicated that in the last 12 yrs. they had worked in 6 areas which progressed well.

Clerk reminded the board that a public hearing had been set for a "Snow-Mobile" Ordinance on December 14, 1970 at 7:00 P.M. and at 8:00 P.M. a Public Hearing would be held relative to new "Stop Signs" through the village.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a public hearing will be held by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, at the Park and Club Building, 149 East Main Street, in the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, at 7:00 P. M., Eastern Standard Time, on December 14, 1970, upon the question, of the enactment of the following Ordinance of the Village of Palmyra entitled: Ordinance for the Regulation of Snowmobiles within the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, Pursuant the Provisions of Article 8 of the Conservation Law of the State of New York", to wit:

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THE VILLAGE OF PALMYRA, WAYNE COUNTY, NEW YORK, PURSUANT THE PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE 8 OF THE CONSERVATION LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK

Section 1. Declaration of Purpose and Policy.

The restrictions and the regulations concerning the operation of snow-mobiles within the limits of the Village of Palmyra are hereby established for the purpose of promoting the public safety, convenience, and welfare of the inhabitants of the Village of Palmyra.

Section 2. Definitions

The words and terms used in this Ordinance, unless otherwise expressly stated, or unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires, shall have the same meaning as defined in Section 8-0105 of the Conservation Law of the State of New York.

Section 3. Regulations

Except as hereinafter specifically permitted by this Ordinance, all snowmobiles operated on public or private property within the Village of Palmyra shall comply with all the provisions of Article 8 of the Conservation Law of the State of New York.

- (a) Operation of snowmobiles on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra within the Village of Palmyra is hereby permitted pursuant the provisions of Section 4 of Article 8 of the Conservation Law of the State of New York.
- (b) No person under the age of eighteen (18) years shall operate a snowmbile on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra except that a and under the age of 18 years person over the age of sixteen (16) years/may operate said vehicle conditioned upon said person holding a snowmobile safety certificate.
- (c) No person shall operate a snowmobile on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra after the hour of 10:00 P. M. on Sunday, Monday,

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and 12:00 P. M. on Friday and Saturday,

- (d) No person shall operate a snowmobile on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra on any day prior to the hour of 8:00 A. M. at any time.
- (e) No person shall operate a snowmobile on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra without a certificate establishing that the operator is insured with an insurance company licensed to do business within the State of New York to a liability limit of not less than \$10,000.00/\$20,000.00.
- (f) No person shall operate a snowmobile on the public streets of the Village of Palmyra without compliance with the traffic laws of the Village and the State of New York as to the movement of motor vehicles on public highways concerning but not limited to speed, driving on the right, stop signs, stop lights and parking.

Section 4. Penalties

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Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished, upon conviction, by a fine of not exceeding \$250.00 for each violation. In addition each violation of this enactment shall constitute disorderly conduct and each person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.
