- Present:** Mayor Sidney J. Fitzgerald, and Trustees David McGuire, Lloyd A. Green, Absent Trustees Robert Brown and Warner Strong.
- Vouchers:** Motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried, to approve payment of the vouchers in the amount of \$290,161.71.
- Minutes:** Motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, to approve minutes of the previous meeting.
- Pal. Agr. Fair Permit:** Anthony Villani, Director of the Palmyra Fair Association and legal counsel for the association commented on the letter recently received by the Fair Association from the Village Clerk advising that it would be necessary for the association to obtain a permit and to provide a holding tank large enough for depositing waste from all trailers at the or on the fairgrounds. Zoning Officer Wideman commented on the unsanitary conditions of the "carney people" of not only rubbish heaped in piles, but also raw sewage deposited in "make-shift" holes in the ground, during the fair last year.

- By-Pass Permit Enforce Sanitation:** Mayor Fitzgerald suggested that we might "by-pass" the permit but enforce the sanitary health conditions at the fair. Attorney Villani commented that they, the Fair Association, try to be "good neighbors". He reiterated their position as a pre-existing event prior to zoning, and was their feeling that such a permit was not necessary.
- Notice & Orders:** Zoning Officer, Bruce Wideman, informed the board that he has issued "Notice & Order" to several owners of property at 118, 120, and 126 Market Street. Signs were also tacked on the structures indicating "Housing was Unfit". Wideman commented that he felt these areas should now be made to be "cleaned-up".
- Comm. Ctr.:** Mrs. Lois Lynch, representative of the Community Center Board advised that she had met with the Palmyra Fair Association, who in turn have indicated that land in the fairgrounds, a specific spot to be designated, may be available to the Community Center for the purpose of constructing a community center. Village Board advised Mrs. Lynch to agree with the Fairgrounds Association on a designated spot, fill out a building permit, which in turn would be rejected or denied by the zoning officer, and apply for a hearing with the payment of \$25.00 before the Zoning Board of Appeals.
- Revenue Sharing:** Mrs. Lynch commented that funds from the United Fund had not been received, as previously when it was a local fund drive. As a result, the Center was somewhat short and could use funds if such could be arranged from the Revenue Sharing. She commented that if some could be diverted to the Center, rather than using all for a Village Barn, it would be appreciated.
- R. Smith:** Ray Smith, Highway Foreman commented that he had no immediate problems.
- H. Van Etten:** Hiram VanEtten, Water Plant Operator, informed the board that a short time ago, he had reported to the state a water loss of nearly 35%. Recently, a representative from the Foxboro Co. tested the instrument to find that it was recording fast. As a result, with the refiguring of the previous readings, it now appears that there is only a 15% water loss, which is a little more realistic.
- Police Report:** Trustee McGuire read a report from Police Chief Henry which indicated that 89 speeders had been apprehended since the first of July. Chief Henry suggested that in light of this, and due to the reluctance on the part of the Town Justices to hold court in the absence of the Village Police Justice, it would behoove the Village of Palmyra to again consider the appointment of an assistant Police Justice. The report also revealed that Section 250.25 of the Penal Code states that it is an offense to tamper with private communications.
- Landfill:** Trustee Green advised that a letter from the state indicated that the Landfill is in a satisfactory condition.
- Flood Program:** Trustee Green informed the board that homes must be built in accordance with specifications of HUD in order to qualify for Flood Relief.
- Woodward Assoc. Chg. Order:** Woodward Associates recalled by letter the previous suggestions of Change Orders in relation to the alterations at the sewer plant. Change Order #1 on Contract I covers replacing the specified hose mask with a self contained breathing apparatus which is now required by the N.Y.S. Dept of Envir. Conser. and the new OSHA directed. Cost of same \$718.39. Change Order #1, on Contract IV, relative to replacing the existing underground conduit with plastic coated, galvanized conduit to protect from corrosion. Cost of change approved by Village Board in 1972, July. Cost of this is \$3,475.99.
- Approval Chg. Orders:** The following motion was made by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried:
WHEREAS, it was apparent for the best interest of the updating of the sewer disposal plant to incorporate Change Order #1 on Contract #1 and Change Order #1 on Contract #4 for the sums of \$718.30 and \$3,475.99 respectively,
BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the change orders as requested by Woodward Associates be approved.

- State & Fed. Grants:** On motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried, Mayor Fitzgerald was authorized to sign the forms requesting the balance due on State & Federal Grants in connection with the alterations of the Sewage Disposal Plant.
- Traffic Light:** A letter from John Jermano, N.Y.S. Dept. of Transportation in Newark, indicated that if the Village of Palmyra so desires to place a traffic light on Canandaigua Street, Route #21, such would be possible at village expense. Trustee Brown, in charge of the highway department, will be asked to check into the matter of cost of light, etc.
- Arcadia Taxi Svc.:** Girard Herman, Newark, N.Y., discussed with the board extending his taxi service to the Palmyra area. He indicated that there are many customers from Garlock who may be visiting and need transportation to the Rochester airport. Mayor Fitzgerald commented that the board was in favor of such a service in Palmyra. Herman revealed that it costs about \$1,400.00 per car to start a service and for this reason plus giving the service to customers, he would like to negotiate a franchise with the village. Board members felt that such a service would be commendable, but at the present time, it would be better to allow Herman to operate as he saw fit and perhaps later a franchise might be in order.
- J. Kenny Re: Vill. Hall Roof:** Joseph Kenny, Savannah, N.Y., who has in the past repaired the slate roof on the Village Hall, discussed the repair of the west side of the Village Hall Roof. In the last few months when there have been drenching rains, James Campbell, Community Center Director, has literally run out of buckets to catch not just drips, but running streams of water from the roof onto the Community Center floor. Kenny said that he could go on patching the brittle slate roof, but each time he tries to carefully step or walk on a good piece to repair a bad piece, the good piece cracks. It would be his suggestion that rather than continue a patching process, the village consider replacing a section by section of the west side of the building. It is his belief that the underneath boards are still good and a 30# asbestos roof could be placed on the usable boards. The cost for this would be approximately \$1,500.00. Mr. Kenny was advised that inasmuch as there was not a full board present, it would be brought up at the next regular board meeting for consideration.
- Village Barn:** Mayor Fitzgerald advised that as soon as an attorney may be appointed, it would be possible to negotiate a lease for 20 years at \$1.00 per year with the Town of Palmyra to allow the village to place the village barn on the Town of Palmyra property adjacent to the Town Barns.
- Signs: Salzburg Village** Mr. Albright, representative of John Martin, who has developed the Salzburg Village area, south of West Foster Street, with an access way on the pathway Laurentian Drive, owned by Mr. Martin, asked permission to place directional signs mainly on Route #31 and Foster on 7 corners, signs to be 2' x 4', for a period of one to 3 months in order that they might promote or aid in the promotion of occupancy of this development. Board agreed that such would be allowed until such time when citizens might complain of the signs obstructing one's view.
- Urban Renewal:** Mayor Fitzgerald commented that he would request a report from the Urban Renewal Agency Director, William Roche, in connection with the expenses incurred by the agency that might be presented to the public in the newspaper.

Vouchers: On motion by Trustee Brown, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, approval for payment of the vouchers in the amount of \$9,253.85 was noted.

Minutes: Trustee Strong objected to several topics in the previous minutes which were: Allowing the Palmyra Agricultural Society to open the annual fair without a Permit; allowing the developers of Salzburg Village to place signs in strategic spots throughout the Village of Palmyra to advertise their apartments for a possible period of three months; commenting that the Police Chief should not be quoting law; Community Center, represented by Mrs. Lois Lynch, appeared to be soliciting additional funds from the Village when only a specified amount has been budgeted; and clerk should send minutes of meeting out the following day, and not two days before the next meeting. Mayor Fitzgerald explained all of the above to Trustee Strong and on motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee McGuire, minutes of previous meeting were approved as written.

Request M. Mahoney: Mrs. Morris Mahoney, owner of property at 401 Canal Street, which she rents, advised that last year she had asked permission to clean up the area behind her property in the Erie Canal Bed. Board advised that she could do so but that no buildings or such could be placed on it. A neighbor, Esther Boland, recently has been parking a bus in front of the Mahoney property, causing an obstruction from the house of any view of the street. When asked to remove bus, Bolands then placed the bus on the area that the Mahoney's had cleaned up in the Erie Canal Bed. Mrs. Mahoney was advised to write a letter to the Village Board which would in turn answer her letter indicating that they might use the land until such time as the village might need it for their use. Michael Colacino had indicated to Mayor Fitzgerald that he would be willing to share in the expense of repairing the area behind the United States Post Office.

Clerk revealed that the Post Office is the property of Michael Colacino and is leased by the U.S. Gov't. The area between Cady & Mate Funeral Home and the bowling alley, recently purchased by William Kaveny, is the property of the Village of Palmyra. The area east of this, which is vacant and is used as a parking lot, is the property of James Patridge, but by a lease agreement between the Village of Palmyra and James Patridge, the village does grade, keep the dust down, plow in the winter and might oil and stone, if the board so directs.

Review of Wat. Con-tract: Mayor Fitzgerald reviewed negotiations of the water contract between the Village of Manchester and the Village of Palmyra outlining the desire on the part of the Village of Manchester about ten (10) years ago, which prompted them to request a connection to the Village of Palmyra Water Line, which, in essence, is located in the Town of Manchester, in order that they might be assured of sufficient water should their wells become dry, especially in the fall. Ultimately, after the proper legal formalities of application to the State Water Control Commission, the connection was made, a test was run, and the contracts signed first in 1963 with a modification in 1967. After the test flow, it was not necessary or has not been necessary for the Village of Manchester to obtain water from the line.

Manches-ter Comments: Attorney John Tyo mentioned the correspondence which began last fall and eventually a meeting was arranged in February to discuss the dormant contract. Attorney Tyo commented that the former Trustee F. Alderman emphasized that the Village of Palmyra has had to pay very high taxes on the water line which stretches through the Town of Manchester but there was no demand that the

Comments:**

Village of Manchester would be the recipient of a water bill for unused water. The situation was complicated by the fact that the Village of Palmyra was being "milked" by taxes which, if assessments could be lowered, would help the financial picture of the Village of Palmyra Water Fund. With this thought in mind, of attempting to lower the assessment, the Village of Manchester was surprised to receive a bill of \$23,130.00, in early June, when almost simultaneously, the Village of Palmyra received a notice from the Town of Manchester indicating a decrease of assessment of \$12,000. on the water line.

Trustee Strong queried if the Village of Manchester planned to renew the contract in years to come.
Mayor Liberty intimated that he felt the Village of Manchester probably would want to keep the contract.
Trustee Brown interjected that with the reduction of the assessment and ultimately, taxes, all of this should be taken into consideration.
Trustee Strong reiterated that since the reduction of assessment, negotiations may be in order.
Attorney Tyo questioned what would be the value of keeping the contract in force. A check with their engineers would be in order.
Trustee Strong suggested that an agreement may be reached on a present figure of amount due and then establish the current contract for the future.
Attorney Tyo felt that knowledge of the tax rate would be of value in determining what the reduction in dollars would amount to, to the Village of Palmyra; and secondly, how highly does the Village of Manchester regard the contract.
