The following resolution was proposed by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee Alderman and carried: Essence of resolution requested leaders in the State Government beginning with Gov. N. A. Rockefeller to exercise their influence to legislate some revisions of the laws to provide more equitable costs of town services and exempt villages from paying for services never received.

Resolution urging enactment of state laws to relieve property owners within the Village of Palmyra from taxes levied by the Town of Palmyra for services provided by the town exclusively in the unincorporated area.

WHEREAS, the existing provisions of town law are outdated in view of the modern services provided by towns and villages, and **WHEREAS**, many provisions of the town law provide services that are general town charges which were enacted before town services became so intense and before villages provided a great many services, and,

WHEREAS, the general population growth in towns and villages in the past seventy years has resulted in tremendous increases in the cost of operating town and village governments, and,

WHEREAS, town law does not provide a means of levying taxes on real property receiving extra benefits, but must levy taxes on the entire area of the town, including the area within villages.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

Section 1. That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra hereby recommends that the proper legislation be enacted to relieve property owners within the Village of Palmyra from taxes levied by the Town of Palmyra for services provided by the Town exclusively in the unincorporated area.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that the state legislature revise the laws to provide for the equitable allocation of town costs for town services to be certain that those who receive such services pay for the same, while those who do not receive such services are relieved from the cost thereof.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that copies of the resolution be sent to Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, Senator Fred Warder and Assemblyman James Hurley, Senator Warren Anderson, Senator Joseph Zaretzki, Minority Leader of the Senate, Speaker of the Assembly Perry B. Duryea, Majority Leader of the Assembly John E. Kingston, and Minority Leader of the Assembly Stanley Steingut.

Leak:** Trustee Alderman informed the board that the leak in the road at the approximate intersection of the East Lake Road, and the former Route #5 & 20 on Canandaigua Lake had been repaired. He commented that the cost would probably be in excess of \$3,000.00 as it was necessary to cut the highway and dig down seventeen (17) feet. In order to accomplish this, it was necessary to obtain steel bracing, and replace the highway by filling with gravel and coldpatch. Trustee Alderman advised that there is another leak in the same vicinity adjacent to property owned by a tavern which will have to be repaired.

Annex.: Trustee Alderman commented that he has heard the rumor that several more residents are anxious to annex to the Village of Palmyra. (This would be in the vicinity of the Canandaigua Road area).

Trustee Alderman advised that he had had a couple of offers for the purchase of the "Freezer Locker" on Market Street which is the property of the Village of Palmyra. A letter received from Robert C. Pollak, 10 Perrin St., Fairport, N.Y., offered \$500.00 for the property. Board instructed the clerk to write to Mr. Pollak to advise that at present his letter had been placed under advisement.

Attorney Henry B. Nesbitt informed the board that the tenant in the C. Village Attorney H. B. Nesbitt discussed the tavern which is located at the approximate location of the old Routes 5 & 20 and the East Lake Road, outside of the City of Canandaigua on Canandaigua Lake, which is constructed about 5' (Five Feet) from our easement on our water line. He commented that about five years ago a survey was drawn and papers composed but apparently the matter was never completed. Attorney Nesbitt advised that we have a legal right to dig on this property but on the other hand in all fairness, we should not proceed unannounced with heavy equipment which could tear up the premises and make it difficult for the owner and his clientele to enter and depart. Attorney Nesbitt suggested that a 10 to 15 day notice should be given the owner so that he would have ample time to make arrangements for his patrons. Motion was made by Trustee Alderman, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, to have Attorney Nesbitt draft a letter to either the owner of the tavern or his attorney.

Stop:**

Trustee McGuire informed the board that several accidents had occurred at the corner of East Jackson & Fayette. He had been approached by several residents requesting that this be made a 4-Way Stop. Board to consider the matter.

Clerk informed the board that Alice Cowell, Police Lady at the corner of Canandaigua and East and West Jackson Street, as well as several other citizens had advised that the Shelter for the Police Lady at this corner caused a "blind spot" for traffic which has caused several accidents. It would be their suggestion that the shelter be removed or placed in a better spot.

Motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee Alderman and carried, that the shelter shall be removed as soon as convenient for the highway crew to take care of same.

**Police
Report:**

On motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Brown and carried, the Police Report for the month of February, 1973 was read and approved. Highlights of the report indicated 142 complaints along with 3 Petit Larceny and 5 arrests for speeding. Fines and bail forfeitures amounted to \$77.00.

**A. Granger
Re: Dump:**

Allen Granger, who has been operating the Village of Palmyra Dump since June 1, 1972 conferred with the board advising that if he were to take the operation in the ensuing year, it would be necessary for him to have a man on full-time. Last month, he commented, he ran short of tickets but this month he has had a man working early. He advised that he would need \$10,000.00 for operation and maintenance plus the \$.75 per yard. If Garlock, Inc., would come in, as they had indicated last year they would, this would help the situation. With an increase in volume he could give us the same contract as last year but he advised that without the volume of Garlock, actually he takes as much fill for the small amount. Granger discussed at length the methods of operation and commented that the village helped to cover and make the land ready for operation last spring.

March 12, 1973

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A.Granger re:Dump: Many times, he reiterated, he felt like breaking the contract with the Village. Volume is the answer to a successful landfill.

R.Kirchhoff, Assessor: Robert Kirchhoff, Assessor for the Village of Palmyra estimates that there will be approximately \$17,500,000. of assessed valuation to base the tax rate for the next year. This is up about \$450,000. over last year. There was a loss of \$93,980. in Urban Renewal, but the Village picked up \$400,000. in the Salzberg Village off West Foster Street. Eventually this project will be assessed at about \$125,000,000. When Urban Renewal buys property, it becomes tax exempt. The old age exemptions amounted to about a quarter million.

P.Rubery Pet. for Annex E.Foster & Howell: Attorney Paul Rubery discussed petitions of the residents of the area on East Foster Street who have indicated that they wish to be annexed to the Village of Palmyra. This would be an extension of the Howell Street Residents, as well as those on East Foster below Johnson Road to the east. Possibly, those residents on East Foster who are in the Town of Palmyra and who are just outside the corporation limits of the Village of Palmyra will be interested in annexing. Dr. Vincent Smith is the one who has been promoting this idea.

Annex Cemetery: Attorney Rubery commented that the Village of Palmyra owns property known as Cemetery Land which appears to be in the Town of Palmyra and should be annexed at the same time that this other property might come in. Motion by Trustee Alderman, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried to authorize Mayor Nussbaumer to sign the proper papers to allow the village to become a part of the annexation. Cost of this would be about \$100.00.

Adjourn: Mayor Nussbaumer adjourned the meeting at 9:30 P.M.

Boy Scout Presentation to Board: Glenn Smith, 415 East Main Street, emissary of Boy Scout Troop "Canaltown Troop #66" presented to the Board of Trustees a framed Certificate of Appreciation to the Village of Palmyra in thanks for allowing the boy scouts to use the facilities of the Village Park on East Main Street, and the Park & Club Bldg., during Boy Scout Week in February and especially on February 9th, 10th and 11th. Board unanimously acknowledged their thoughtfulness and advised the young man that they were glad to be able to grant a request for such a worthwhile project.

Plan. Board Letters: Mayor Nussbaumer informed the board that he had received letters from Charles Collie and Donald Wallace as well as a call from George Larsson, who advised that they would be willing to serve on the Planning Board. Consensus of the board indicated that appointments should be delayed until after village elections when a new board may make the appointments.

Vil.Barn on Town Land: Trustee Alderman informed the board that he had obtained a survey drawn by Harnish & Lookup relative to the property of the Town of Palmyra on Kent Street on which the present Town Barn is located and on which the village hopes to obtain either by purchase or a satisfactory agreement an area of 250 x 250 feet. Clerk instructed to write a letter to the Town Board enclosing a copy of the survey for their perusal.

Webaco Oil, re: Price increase: The Village of Palmyra has been purchasing gasoline at a state bid price from Webaco Oil, distributors of Citgo, but because of loss of support, they have advised that they can no longer give us this price on premium gas. However, they could supply it to us for \$.244/gal.

March 19, 1973

State Bid Price: Clerk advised that in checking with Phil Rice, Wayne County Highway Dept., the name of Engleson & Van Liere, Wolcott, N.Y. was suggested as supplying the county with gasoline at state bid price of \$.1675/gal. for premium gas.

Purchase from Engleson & VanLiere Motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried, to authorize the clerk to arrange with Engleson & VanLiere in Wolcott, N.Y. to obtain premium gasoline at the state bid price of \$.1675.

Park & Club Bldg.: It had been brought to the attention of the board that the east wall in the basement of the Park & Club Bldg. and the east wall on the second floor needed repairing due to the fact that water in the past had seeped in causing the wall to flake and buckle in some spots. Members of the Fire Department have volunteered to do the work with the materials to be paid for by the village. Board members authorized an expenditure of \$800.00 for re-furbishing.

Ann. Pol. Justice Report: Police Justice Paul Rubery submitted his annual report along with documents and records for review of the board. From 3/1/72 - 2/28/73, there were a total of 620 dispositions, with 328 being vehicle and traffic, 192 parking violations, 93 criminal cases, 4 youthful offender cases and 3 civil cases. Total fees including bail forfeitures amounted to \$3,753.50 with bail on hand as of 2/28/73 in the amount of \$470.00. On motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried, the report was ordered filed.

R.Colvin Fire, 264 Fayette St.: Robert Chapman, Chapman Home Improvements, spoke to the board in behalf of Ray Colvin, owner of property at 264 Fayette St. which was gutted by fire during the last week, and who is an employee of R. Chapman, relative to the placing of a trailer in the rear of the lot so that the family might have a place to live while repairs are being made on the house. The trailer to be placed on a six month basis.

WHEREAS, the home of R. Colvin, 264 Fayette Street, was gutted by fire, leaving the family homeless, and,

WHEREAS, Robert Chapman, Chapman Home Improvements, Macedon, has available a trailer which could be placed in the lot to provide a home for the family,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Board of Trustees shall allow such trailer to be placed on the rear lot for a six month period, so that remodeling can be accomplished in the gutted house,

PROVIDED THAT, the neighbors have been contacted to ask their permission to move such a structure on their, the neighbor's property, in order to reach the rear of the Colvin lot, and that such neighbors are in agreement with allowing these living quarters during the six month period.

Urb. Ren. W.Roche: William Roche, Urban Renewal Director, commented to the board that demolition is nearly complete. The property of Irving Lazerson on Canal Street, which has not been demolished inasmuch as there has been a hold-up of a closing, will soon be in the hands of the Urban Renewal Agency, according to Attorney P. Rubery. The Palmyra Building Supply has not been pressed to vacate but with the completion of the Lazerson property, this will follow.

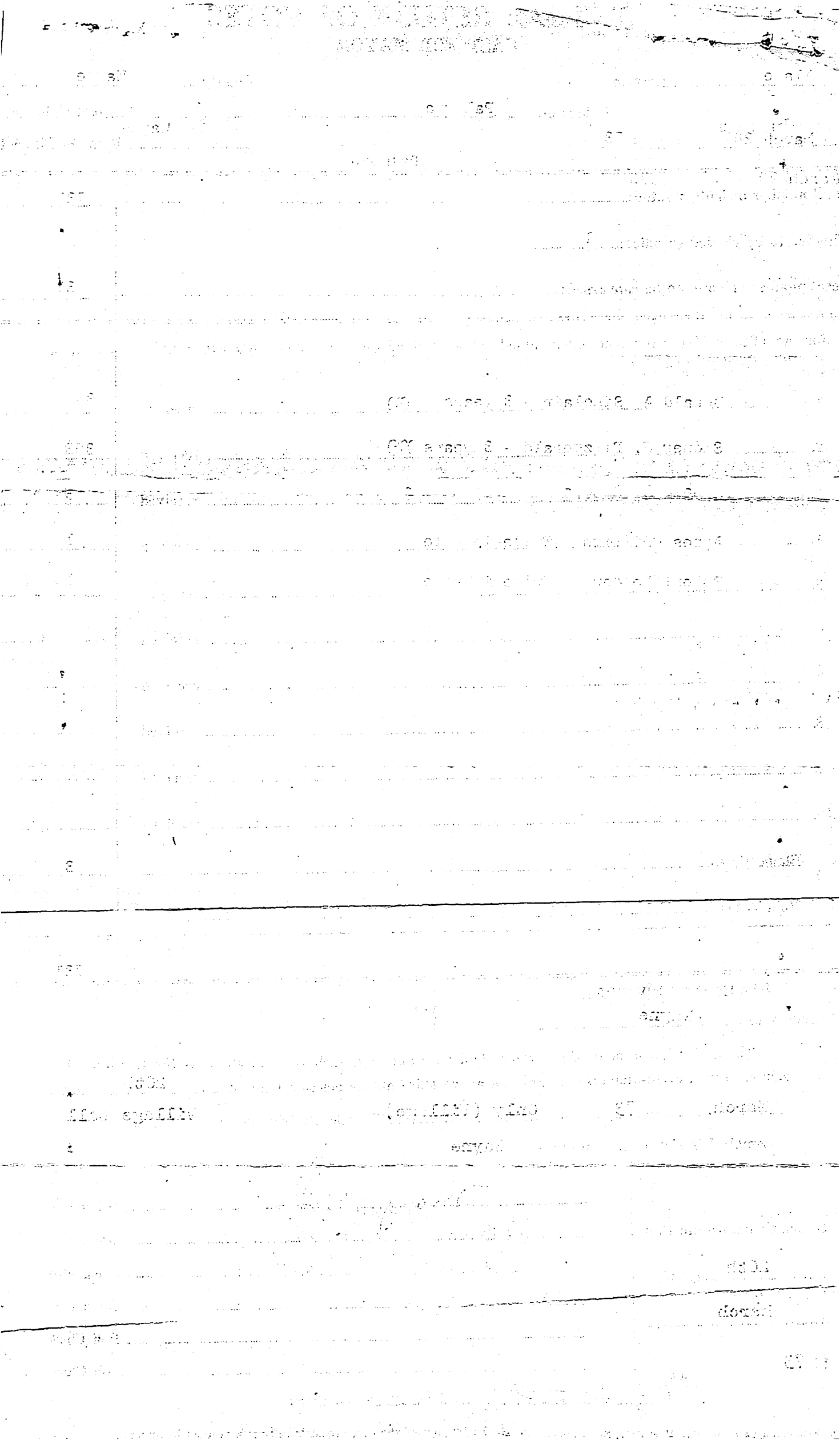

Van Etten, who has viewed the premises of the Canandaigua Street Elementary School, it would appear that the blow-off valve which emits water once a week from the furnace into the sanitary sewer system, may remain in operation, as the connection is so slight that it would not appreciably affect the sanitary sewer system.
