They indicated that to would be glad to have the village offices write to President Raymond LeRoy regarding any complaints which may be received by the village from citizens. The Fair Association, they reiterated, are willing to cooperate.

Pal.Agri. Trustee Brown commented that the Fair Association is mulling over Sewerage: the idea of placing septic tanks in the grounds to take care of the many trailers which inhibit the fairgrounds during fair week. Attorney Nesbitt interjected that this would not be legal as the sewer ordinance does not tolerate such connections. However, it might be possible for them to have holding tanks, but the proper procedure would be to install a sanitary sewer line on the west side of the grounds. (Complete text of the meetingwith the association precedes this transcript of minutes, inasmuch as the meeting was held on 11/1/72).

Comm. Ctr.: The Palmyra Fair Association commented that they would be pleased to lease the land for a joint venture of the village and town for a Community Center. This would be an ideal spot for such a community recreation center.

Dog Leash Law??:

Mrs. Janet O'Dea and Mrs. Heather Valentine, presented the information that they had obtained relative to the number of dogs (529 in village and 1100 in town) for the perusal of the Village Board in their desire to press for a leash law. The dog leash law as used by the Village of Pittsford was shown. I would be their desire to have a 24 hour leash on dogs. Trustee Alderman pointed out that the town collects the fees for the licensing of dogs and the village does not receive any portion, thereof, much to their surprise.

Dog

Dog Warden for the Village of Palmyra, Harold Fisher, commented that at present he has had no problems but more recently, small Comments: dogs have been dumped by the wayside, in front of homes, etc. a result, he had been fortunate to find good homes for these puppies, or he has taken them to Lollipop Farm. However, if the situation worsens, he believes that he would need some assistance. Occasionally, he commented, he has wondered about dogs that do not have any identification.

Control:

Attorney Nesbitt interjected that the petition as presented by these ladies has the word "Control" in relation to the dog as being obedient to the master. It was his thought that this word "Control" should be more clearly defined.

Laurent. Simmons Development Corp. showed slides which they had taken of Drive the Sanitary Sewer Line installed by John Martin & Co. on Sew.Line: the pathway Laurentian Drive. The pictures were taken at 3 ft. intervals. Joints, it was noted are of concrete asbestos, and to all appearances, nothing will catch on the joints. Approximately

600 ft. of the sewer line was photographed with a notation that there are 4 breaks that should be repaired by John Martin before he dedicates the street to the village. Simmons suggested that it might be possible to place a clamp at these strategic spots. They advised that it cost approximately 60¢/ft. to take the pictures.

Trustee Alderman commented that the taxes on the water line Line Tax: amount to about \$13,000.00 annually. Attorney Nesbitt advised that if the board feels that the village is overassessed, perhaps they should consider going to grievance day to voice their objections. If, after a properly filed complaint, they are still dissatisfied, it could be taken to court. Attorney Nesbitt concluded that a water line is a proprietary function while a village hall is not.

Steel Flag Pole: Clerk informed the board that John Blazey had been contacted to seek his cooperation in attempting to untangle the snarls in the rope on the flag pole. Mr. Blazey wondered if it would be

The letter indicated that unless steps were taken immediately to correct these flows, the village might loose State and Federal Aid under the Operation and Maintenance State Aid programs and with the additions and alterations now in progress at the sewerage disposal plant. Suggested corrections were:

Remove illegal roof connections. 1. Remove storm water connections. 2.

Evaluate entire system by means of closed circuit television, if necessary.

Proposed program to be instituted by the Village should be sent to the N.Y.S. Dept. of Environ. Conservation by 12/1/72.

O.Sneidze Mr. Sneidze mentioned that storm drain water, such as roof drains, Suggests: sump pumps, cellar drains, cross connections of storm water, low areas may flood during storms and get into the manholes. It would be his suggestion that people should be asked publicly to disconnect these drains by a certain date. Following this, the water department might go through properties, checking each house. After this a mass mailing to all property owners, might be in (Confer with attorney to ascertain legality). Smoke bombs in roof drains may be of help. Lastly, a check of all main storm sewer connections. If there is still an excess amount of water at the disposal plant, then put dyes in the system and photograph. Trustee Brown and Trustee Green were asked by Mayor Nussbaumer to compose a letter of procedure.

Inspect. Sewer Plant:

O. Sneidze commented that there would be an inspection of the work completed by a federal representative on 11/29/72 at 11:30 A.M. at the sewerage disposal plant. H. VanEtten, operator of the Sewage Disposal Plant, commented that various pieces of equipment had been received which are items that are already in the plant, having been previously purchased, prior to the letting of the contract by Mr. VanEtten. Mr. Sneidze had viewed the contract which indicated that these items in question would not have to be accepted.

Orders:

Mr. Sneidze commented that there has been only one change order in the contract to date.

such an easement.

Raw Wat. Trustee Alderman advised that a leak in the raw water line had been discovered at the vicinity of the Canandaigua Radio Station.

- 2. The Palmyra Police Study Committee having been appointed by Mayor Nussbaumer and having fulfilled the purpose for which they were appointed, be thanked for their valuable time and effort, each and everyone individually, and be so excused from further responsibility."

H. Van Etten re: Wat. in San. Sew .: Hiram VanEtten, operator of the Sewer Plant, discussed the proposed program which he has instituted relative to inspection of any infractions by the homeowner of storm sewer water being pumped into the sanitary sewer. VanEtten commented that he had had cards printed and has run the cards through the addressing machine so that they have an accurate list of all property owners. The next step would be to have list of all property owners. his assistants make a street by street check of each and every house or building which is connected to the sanitary sewer to ascertain if there is any storm water which is being

House by House Check:

diverted voluntarily or unknowingly into the sanitary sewer system. A record will be made on each card and all infractions will be separated. It would be his suggestion that the owner should be notified with a time limit of 6/1/73 allowed in which to correct any infractions.

December 18, 1972

Crescent Dr.Storm Sew. :

In the meantime, the village will proceed as weather will permit, to install a storm sewer line on Crescent Drive and

all owners will be expected to connect.

Lastly, if between November 1, 1973 and the spring of 1974, there is no noticeable decrease in the flow at the disposal plant, dyes and finally photographs of the line should be instituted.

Non-Comply Legal:

Attorney Nesbittcommented that if property owners fail to comply, they can be arrested for violation of the sewer ordinance.

Propos. Program:

Trustee Brown outlined in detail a proposed plan which will be submitted to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in relation to their vehement objection to the excessive flow into the system at various times. The State department emphasized that if the matter were not corrected, the village could well loose the state aid which it receives annually as a one-third (1/3) of the operation and maintenance of the sewage disposal plant.

Resol.:

The following motion was made by Trustee Brown, 2nd by Trustee Alderman and carried:

WHEREAS, Hiram VanEtten, operator of the Sewer Plant, had previously informed the Village Board that he felt there must be some illegal connections of storm water flowing into the sanitary sewer, and,

WHEREAS, On inspection of the Sanitary Sewer Disposal Plant by representatives of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation along with Woodward Associates, Consulting Engineers for the Village of Palmyra, it appears that an excessive flow of water infiltrates the trunk lines causing abnormal flow into the Sewage Disposal Plant at various times, mainly during spring thaws or heavy downpour

of rain.
BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Village of Palmyra undertake an intensive house to house check of all connections to the sanitary sewer, keeping accurate records of all illegal connections, after which homeowners will be notified to correct same by June 1, 1973, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, if the above does not prove

to be a decrease in the flow, further check of all eave troughs by smoke bombs will be instigated along with installation of storm sewers on streets where none are now available.

## Clerk-Treasurer

Storm Drain Village Attorney had prepared a proposed easement which would allow the Village of Palmyra to place a storm drain on the property of George Contant at 138 East Main Street in the alleyway between the Village Hall at 144 East Main Street so that storm water could be properly diverted into the storm sewer at the rear or southwest corner of the Village Hall premises. Board instructed Attorney Nesbitt to proceed with drawing the proper forms to be signed.

Laure Dr.: Village Attorney Nesbitt inquired if Mr. Van Etten had been in (Pathway) communication with Simmons & Co., who had photographed the sewer line which had been installed by John Martin on Laurentian Drive. Mr. VanEtten replied that until the four breaks as shown on the films were repaired and new photographs were taken, he would not feel justified in accepting the sewer line as being in good conditions for acceptance by the village. Mr. VanEtten advised that he would contact the proper authorities to try to hasten the repair before the next board meeting.

Appeal of Roche-Kimberly re: Proposed In. Houses

Zon.Brd. K'0's:

Attorney Nesbitt reviewed for the board the events of a public hearing in front of the Village of Palmyra Zoning
Board of Appeals in September, 1969, at which time RocheKimberly were applying for a Special Permit to erect Town
Houses on the property owned by Roche on south Canandaigua
Street, east side which abuts onto property in the Town
of Palmyra, that area adjacent to Bear Hill Drive and
Bolfa Street, prime residential. The Zoning Board of Rolfe Street, prime residential. The Zoning Board of Appeals denied the issuance of a Special Permit, after which Roche-Kimberly appealed to a higher court for a reversal of the local zoning board decision. After much discussion, conferences, etc., on both sides, quite suddenly, it appeared that Roche-Kimberly were dropping the proceedings. The Rochester attorneys, Wiser, Shaw, Freeman, VanGraafeiland Harter & Secrest, who were retained at the suggestion of Village Attorney H. B. Nesbitt, to plead our case, were informed that the matter apparently was closed and their fee VanGraafeiland

was ultimately paid.

It now appears that the case may be re-opened. According to the information at hand, it would appear that Roche-Kimberly in Abandoned: the past had abandoned the original project. It is on this premise that Attorney Nesbitt feels Zoning Board should make its stand. The Village Board agreed that Attorney Nesbitt should follow whatever lines he felt were applicable in this instance. Attorney Nesbitt commented that he had prepared an affidavit for the clerk to read and sign for presentation to the firm of Wiser, Shaw, etc.

Laundromat
The board was informed that papers had been served by the
Sign: Police Department for the Village of Palmyra Zoning Officer,
Illegal: Bruce Wideman, on the owners of the Palmyra Laundromat,
Laurence Potter, for failure to remove the overhanging sign denoting his place of business.

Rogers

Attorney Nesbitt commented that he had learned that the chairs, Chapel organ, bible stand and bible had been removed from the Rogers
Furniture: Memorial Chapel in the cemetery, by the historical society.

Inasmuch as the chapel and its furnishings were entrusted to the Village of Palmyra, Attorney Nesbitt suggested that it would be apropos that a list of the furnishings along with the spot where they have been stored for safe keeping should be on file with the village clerk. Trustee Brown advised that Sheldon Knapp would give him a list.

Vil. Hall Front Door:

Clerk informed the board that the front door had been damaged by 4 youthful offenders who were using the door to hang and swing on until it was dislodged to the point that the casing was torn loose and the door itself was hanging at an angle. Therefore, it had been necessary to lock the door shut and use the rear entrance.

Cost to Repair:

Roche-Kimberly had given a figure of \$375.00 as a cost to repair the door with a metal brace on the side of the casing to which screws would be attached to hold the door. VanDenBout Insurance advised that insurance would cover \$275.00 with the \$100.00 deductible to be paid by the Village. The Police Department has the names of the offenders, but Attorney
Nesbitt commented that inasmuch as there is no ordinance which
can demand payment from the parents of the children, it is now probable that restitution can be made.

Village Barn:

Trustee Alderman commented that the village barn is gradually slipping deeper into the ground with crevices widening daily in the wall structure. A 40' x 120' Metal Frame Building would cost approximately \$13,000.00, assembly to be done by village help. This type of metal frame, Butler Bldg., could be easily disassembled. Trustee Alderman advised that he would try to get an estimate of the cost to repair the barn.

Chipping Christmas Trees:

A letter was received from Mr. Diamond of the State Environmental Department relative to using a chipper to grind up used Christmas trees. He commented that Agway Inc. indicated that they might be desirous of obtaining Christmas Trees which they could grind and use the chips for re-sale. Trustee Brown volunteered to obtain further information.

D. Pope:

A discussion evolved relative to discharging Daniel Pope from the Steering Committee of the Police Study. Inasmuch as there was not a full board present, the matter was tabled.
