S.Gilfus: The contract between the Village of Palmyra and Siegel Gilfus, Caretaker as caretaker of the Village Dump, was presented for signature by Trustee Leysath. Contract provides for an annual payment to S. Gilfus of \$4,500.00, contract to be concurrent with the fiscal year of the Village of Palmyra. On motion by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried, the Mayor of the Village of Palmyra, David Nussbaumer, signed the contract in behalf of the village.

General discussion evolved around the possibility of opening Dump: the back of the dump. It would appear that the most efficient

way to accomplish this would be to backfill.

In addition to possibly help defray the expense of renovating the dump, it was suggested that the committee might study and consider the possibility of charging a pickup truck \$5.00 for Suggest. Chgs: a load, \$10.00 for a regular truck and \$15.00 deposit with a refund to the user of either \$5.00 or \$10.00. (The thought behind this seemed to stem from individuals who contract to clean out a garage, for instance, who are allowed to borrow the dump key for a \$5.00 deposit, such deposit returnable.)

Burn Off: Mayor Nussbaumer mentioned that it would be possible to burn

off some of the debris by applying to the New York State Dept. of Health for a Special Permit. Clerk was instructed to check with at Dump this department.

15 Mi./Hr Calls to the Clerk's Office advised that the Church of God and the Reformed Church would like to have a 15 mi./Hr. signs re moved to include the area of their churches. Henry B. Nesbitt, Village Attorney, advised that these signs are only valid when school is in session. Therefore, there would be no point in changing these signs.

Remov. Meters:

With the flow of traffic on Cuyler Street, it may be advisable to remove parking meters and place "No Parking" in this area. H.B. Nesbitt commented that in front of the school; on Canandaigua Street there is a No Parking ordinance but cars seem to be parked there.

Each board member was asked to check over the village for possible changes in parking, stop signs, etc., such information to be given to the committee and later referred to the attorney for inclusion in a proper ordinance.

To help keep the dust down in the spring, it was suggested that Main St. the snow removal crew use only salt on Main Street rather than Salt: a mixture with cinders.

N.Y.S. Dept. of Transportation had previously advised that they were behind in their work in signing Main Street and the Signs: approaches thereto. Trustee Mierke was asked to check with them again and to ascertain where the village lines or edges on Main Street are located from the center.

Wm.Roche: William Roche and Mr. Beer, owners and developers of Palmyra Community Properties, projected their thoughts and asked the feeling of the village board in relation to the R--1 zone areas in the village as far as development in the future. He commented that as yet there is no decision in connection with the McGonigal property on South Canandaigua Street on which they have proposed to erect a 100 unit housing cooperative, application for which was denied by the Zoning Board of Appeals, followed by request for an appeal; to a higher court for a reversal of this decision. Objections to the Townhouse development seemed to be an increase in traffic, increase in the number of children in the area, overcrowding of the public school, too many people in one conjected area. Mr. Roche then informed the board that they do have an alternate plan which would be a nursing home along with related facilities and housing for the elderly and for those who need care but cannot get around. This is known

as Proprietary Care where one has a room but is able to go to a dining area. In addition, he would have the privilege of nursing care. There would also be adequate room for a related facility or a medical center for doctors.

Fire Escape The fire escape on the west wall of the community center may be removed providing the door is well barricaded. Motion by Trustee Mierke, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried to so instruct the Highway Dept. to request the removal.

Canal Town:

Gerald Griffin, co--proprieter of Canal Town, suggested to the board at the "Gripe Session" that the trash behind all the stores might be placed in a common recepticale, especially for the merchant's use. The idea seemed a good one and the clerk was asked to compose a letter directed to the merchants which would be signed by the Fire Chief. (Note: Letter composed and given to Chief O'Brien who called to say that he inspects this area weekly and sometimes more often. In his opinion, the biggest offender is the Canal Town business. feels that the merchants cooperate very well in removing the trash and feels that he would prefer to talk to them personally.)

Steel Flag Pole:

Trustee Sinclair advised that he had talked to John Blazey who would like to have the opportunity to replace the pole on top of the steel framework so that we might be able to fly a flag.

R.Kommer Prob.

The following motion was made by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee

Patrolman: RESOLVED: That Ronald Kommer, Maple Avenue, be appointed for a 6 month probationary period as patrolman in the Palmyra Police Department, beginning as of June 9, 1970.

Request

C.Bucknam: Calvin Bucknam, East Foster Street, at his expense removed a dead tree between the sidewalk and road. He asked that the village include the stump for removal when bids are let for grinding stumps. Board agreed that this shall be done.

Utility Tax:

H.B. Nesbitt, Village Attorney advised that it would be his suggestion that the utility tax become effective on September 1st and each quarter thereafter. Proper formalities are being processed in preparation for a public hearing.

Palette Show:

Mayorl Nussbaumer informed the board that he had been asked for permission for the Palette Club to have a showing in the Village Park and the Main Street at the time of the Mormon Pageant. Board agreed this would be an ideal time for such a display. (7/27 - 8/1/70)

Lauren: Drive

Mayor Nussbaumer informed Mrs. Boland, Laurentian Drive, (socalled, as this is not a dedicated street in the village), that if Ernest Lawrence is cited for an unsanitary condition on his land, that she, in turn, would also fall in the same category. She commented that this would be satisfactory with her. Dr. Bramer will be so informed to proceed with filing the necessary papers.

Tour Garlock:

The Village Board has been invited to tour the factory at Garlock, Inc., along with the Town Board. A suitable nite seems to be June 17th, at 7:00 P.M., the group to meet at the reception office at which time Jack Lynn will escort the tour.

Urban Renewal Office:

Investigation has proved that it would be feasible to move the present Urban Renewal Office from 307 East Main Street, where the office has been paying rent, to the Contant Building at 138 East Main Street to be housed with Mr. William Roche's own office, Palmyra Community Properties, on a rent-free basis.

Watershed The Village of Palmyra has been informed that there will be a Inspector: meeting of all villages at Canandaigua on June 18, 1970 at 8:00 P.M., at which time the discussion will be concerned with the possible appointment of a watershed inspector for

Canandaigua Lake, in that the previous inspector resigned early in the year. Trustee Mierke advised that he would try to attend this meeting.

Route #31:

Information from the N.Y.S. Department of Transportation along with a map outlining suggested routes for Route #31 requested Clerk was inthat the board pick a possible desired route. formed to advise that department that it was the consensus of the board that the most northernly route would be the best.

Water:

Proposed Mayor Nussbaumer and Trustee Mierke showed the village board maps of possible water lines from Lake Ontario which would be extended to the Village of Palmyra.

Light

Light Mayor Nussbaumer commented that in talking with the group who Industry: are anticipating a light industry in the village, it would not be possible at this time for them to give any definite type of industry. Trustee Leysath interjected that he personally feels that the village should not relinquish any further land such as that where the sewer disposal plant now is situated in that it is quite possible in 10 years, this land would be needed for either expansion or a spot to house village owned buildings.

Club Rooms: A quotation from the Fabric Shop for drapery material in the amount of \$156.34 for drapes in the Club Rooms downstairs area seemed to be reasonalbe and within the budget. Motion by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Mierke and carried to approve this expenditure inasmuch as the Senior Citizens had indicated that they would be willing to make the drapes.

N.Y.Tel. Request: The New York Telephone Co. has requested permission to place guy wires on the corner of East Foster Street and Canandaigua Street and on the corner of East Foster and Fayette. Approval of the board was given for these guy wires on village property between the street or curb and sidewalk.

The Police Report for the month of June, 1970 was reviewed by the board. On motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried, the report was accepted as presented. Police Chief Henry advised the board that in the past the No Park. Signs Village of Palmyra has borne the expense for the printing, Pal.Fair: placing and removing of the "No PARKING" signs on streets which lead directly to the Palmyra Agricultural Fairgrounds. According to Attorney Nesbitt, the signs serve a purpose on the streets to keep most of the cars from parking on either side. However, legally, they are invalid and would not "hold up in court". The question seems to be whether or not the Fair Association should be asked to at least pay for the printing of these signs. (To be facetious, this is a 2--way street - -- Gates Street, for instance is narrow. With cars parked on both sides, it would be almost impossible for a fire truck to squeeze through, to say nothing of trying to string hose lines from the nearest hydrant. Moreover, should an accident or fire occur on the Fairgrounds, time is of the essence, and could be so to the Fair Association. With streets blocked with cars, this could cause a problem.) BEVERAGES RESOLVED: That the selling of any alcoholic beverages in any public place owned, operated by or controlled by the Village of Palmyra be prohibited and banned.

WayneCo.: A request from the Wayne County Economic Development Corpor-Econ.Dev. ation headed by Russell Fowler, inquired about any available land for industrial development. Trustee Mierke was asked to contact the Town of Palmyra to discuss the matter further.

and Lyons, Wayne County was read. Trustee Mierket volunteered to appear in behalf of the Village of Palmyra.

Wm.Roche: William Roche discussed with the board the wording of the Re:Zoning as it might apply to a Nursing Home. Due to the adverse decisions that he has had in the past in conjunction with applying for Special Permits through the Zoning Board of Appeals, he felt that perhaps a review of some of the definitions might be in order. He referred to Section 401.1 in an R-1 District which allows under "Permitted Uses" the "Institutional Home". In his opinion this wording might be changed to Nursing Home. In addition on page 7 of the Zoning Book under I-pl Nursing Home should replace the words "Institutional Home" and perhaps redefined. (This could be a subject for the Planning Board to delve into.)

Community
Mrs. Lois Lynch, President of the Community Center, discussed with the Village Board a "Welcome to the Mormons" night at the Village Park on July 22, 1970. She requested that a welcome speech or a few words from a village official would be apropos. A band concert, talent show, and light refreshments are envisioned for a successful evening of welcome.

In order to accomplish the above, the cooperation of village crews would be necessary to place park benches, trash cans, re-open the rest rooms, adjacent to the park and a check on the electrical outside wiring would be in order.

Narcotic Gouncil:

Henry B. Nesbitt, Village Attorney, informed the village board that it would be his suggestion that people who would be willing to serve on a Narcotic Council should first be contacted. Following this a council could be arranged with the legal matters drawn to provide for a council. There would be no liability involved in the appointment of such a council. Although the village budget does not provide for any expenditures for such a council, Attorney Nesbitt concurred that no doubt none would be necessary during the first year.

Flag Pole: Attorney Nesbitt informed the Village Board that he had obtained a document signed by the majority of the Republican Committee in the Town and Village of Palmyra which would release the Steel Flag Pole on the corner of Fayette and East Main Street to the custody of the Village of Palmyra. He expected to be able to present same to the Village shortly.

Dump:

Rather than delve into a discussion of an industrial dumper, Mayor Nussbaumer suggested that the committee on the dump study the matter of incorporating the definition of same in a contract beginning next year.

Code of Ethics:

Attorney Nesbitt informed the Village Board that last year a statute was passed by the State of New York which compels each municipality to have a Code of Ethics by the end of this year. The board of ethics in a municipality may be composed of 3 persons. The adoption of same must be on file with the State Department of Audit and Control.

The Sheriff's Department of Wayne County asked per-Call Police: mission to place metal signs adjacent to the phone booths on which is indicated the Palmyra Police Phone of 597-9211. They would be anchored in concrete. Motion by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried.

Open Pub. Trustee Mierke advised that he would confer with Ray Smith, Rest Rms .: Public Works Foreman, relative to paining and cleaning up the public rest rooms adjacent to the park.

Mem. Zon.

R.Brown With the resignation of W.R.Converse from the Zoning Board of Appeals, a motion was made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair to appoint Robert Brown to fill the vacancy. At the present time, he is serving as a member of the Planning Board but had so indicated he would at some time be interested in serving on the Zoning Board. Village Board unanimously approved this recommendation.

Amend Zoning:

Trustee Leysath wished to go on record to recommend that the Village Board proceed with any pertinent changes in relation to hospital and nursing home to better clarify the Zoning Code.

Comm.Ctr. A projected summer program for the Community Center was Planned reviewed by the Village Board and was ordered to be Activities:filed.
