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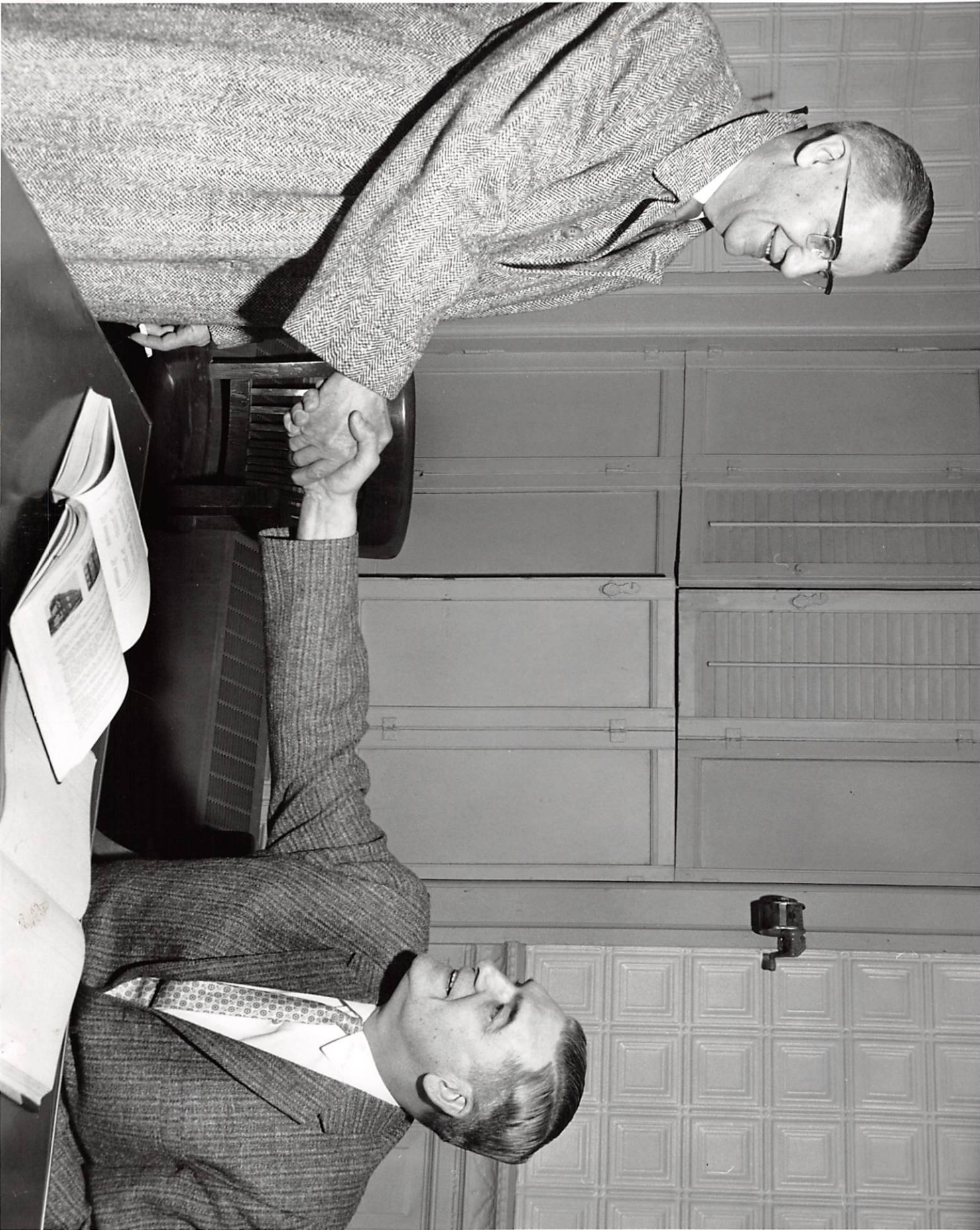

**Duties of
Water
Foreman:**

Mayor Mierke presented a list of duties expected from and of the water foreman, to German and Smith for discussion.

German proposed that item 6-flushing hydrants should be done at night only. Item #8 has been done for some time back.

Mr. Smith on item #6, control valves should be tested once each year.

German questioned item 13-stock of parts on hand. Mr. Mierke explained a necessary stock of hydrants, meters, and other repair material should be available at all times.

German to file a plan for water mains and valves to be installed at a later date to prevent large area shutoffs, when repairs are being made.

Mr. Smith reports that a man should be sent to Grade III water school, and a meter reader should report defects in plumbing at homes during meter reading.

German requested to know how many hours per week he was expected to work a week. No definite answer was made except that plant should be maintained and operated.

Question of Salary of German for 1959-60. Reply was that same salary as 1958-59 providing he expected to carry out the ordinary duties expected from him.

German reported need of a "meter tester" to check water meters accuracy, cost estimated \$900.00 and preferred type manufactured by Badger Meter Co.

Water Department Policy Cont.

- 12 Any valve, hydrant or other defect in the main water lines causing lowered water pressure should be reported to the Chief immediately.
- 13 Inventory of all supplies such as pipe, meters, hydrants, valves, etc., shall be kept current. When stocks reach a minimum of six weeks requirements any new items needed should be reported to Village Clerk who will order same immediately.
- 14 Quantities consumed of chemicals and miscellaneous earth or other ingredients used in the filtering process should be given to Village Clerk once each month in a written report.
- 15 Any village employee working full or part time in the water department must be instructed in all phases of meter reading and complete operation of the water plant and system.

SUMMARY:

Maintenance of and responsibility for the efficient operation of any water system is a vital task. It is a task that requires the highest leadership. It can and should be made a rewarding experience. Proper leadership in this or any other municipal endeavor is very essential. A sincere devotion to the welfare of the people we serve and a continuing promotion of public good will are not insurmountable obstacles but a challenge to any person in public service. If we live by such precepts our village must prosper and grow. If we ignore them, decadence is but a step away. We cannot and will not let this happen.

- 12 Any valve, hydrant or other defect in the main water lines causing lowered water pressure should be reported to Fire Chief immediately.
- 13 Inventory of all supplies such as pipe, meters, hydrants, valves, etc., shall be kept current. When stocks reach a minimum of six weeks requirements any new items needed should be reported to Village Clerk who will order same immediately.
- 14 Quantities consumed of chemicals and diatomaceous earth or other ingredients used in the filtering process should be given to Village Clerk once each month in a written report.
- 15 Any village employee working full or part time in the water department must be instructed in all phases of meter reading and complete operation of the water plant and system.

Summary:

Maintenance of and responsibility for the efficient operation of any water system in a village such as Palmyra is a project not to be taken lightly. It can and should be made a rewarding experience. Proper leadership in this or any other municipal endeavor is very essential. A sincere devotion to the welfare of the people we serve and a continuing promotion of public good will are not insurmountable obstacles but a challenge to any person in public service. If we live by such precepts our village must prosper and grow. If we ignore them, decadence is but a step away. We cannot and will not let this happen.

- Article 1 Make all necessary residual tests and analyses of water daily and maintain records of same as required by State Department of Health. Keep duplicate copy of each report for Palmyra Village files.
- 2 Check turbidity of the water and backwash filters only as needed. Maintain equipment and buildings for efficient operation.
 - 3 Repair and/or replace defective meters within 48 hours after being reported.
 - 4 Supervise and assist in hydrant repair and/or replacement. This work to be completed during favorable weather and prior to freezing conditions.
 - 5 Supervise and assist in all installations of water service. Weather permitting, this work is to be completed within (15) fifteen calendar days from date of approval by village board of Trustees.
 - 6 Personally check all hydrants for leaks or possible need of repair twice annually. First check to be made between April 1 and May 1. Second check to be made between October 1 and November 1. Any repairs to be made in accordance with article 4. Inspect main water line between Canandaigua Lake and Palmyra at least once each year for possible leaks or needed repair.
 - 7 Maintain the most desirable public relations at all times.
