R. Kennedy: Mr. Kennedy interjected that the Village of Palmyra has a reservation in the amount of \$900,000. At the present time there are no new projects being approved by the office of HUD. It was his opinion that we should not cast aside this appropriated amount, but should avail ourselves of it.

M. Collie:

Mr. Collie reaffirmed a previous statement that the problem of rejuvenation of the Main Street stems from the fact there is not ample parking for customers. It is a known fact, he said, that people will go to the new plazas, park in a spot which could be considered perhaps two blocks from the store that they might wish to shop, but as long as they have the "beauty" of the front of the stores to look at as they walk to the desired store, no one complains. But, -- try to get people to park in back of the present stores on Main Street on the south side where there is ample parking, walk up Cuyler to the Main Street Business area, and they are bound to complain that the parking is too far from the stores. Collie said that he would gladly tear down his store, move it back, if some arrangement could be provided for in front parking.

Attorney Henry B. Nesbitt advised the board that the proposed list of stop signs throughout the village had been completed, and suggested that the hearing be scheduled for April 12, 1971 at 7:30 P.M.

Nursing Home: Trustee Leysath commented that Ronald Trumbull, manager of the Gables Nursing Home has been advised by the New York State Department of Health in Albany that they feel it would be wiser on his part to build a new nursing home in Newark so that it would be closer to the Newark-Wayne Community Hospital should an emergency arise. Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath that a letter be sent to Albany explaining that approximately 30 people would be thrown out of work here in Palmyra if the nursing home were erected in Newark rather than in Palmyra.

Holiday Rambler Club: Ralph Umphrey, Williamson, N.Y., spoke in behalf of about 6 members of the area Holiday Rambler Club to advise the board that they had received permission from the Palmyra Union Agricultural Society to hold a New York State conclave in the fairgrounds over Memorial Day weekend, May 27th to June 1st. They had prepared decorative signs with arrows which would direct visitors to the fairgrounds. It was their request to be allowed to place the signs throughout the village in strategic spots to direct the flow of traffic to the fairgrounds. The board agreed that this would be permissable and both the Police Department and Highway Department would be so informed of the influx of trailers over this weekend.

W. Roche:

William Roche, Roche Kimberly Construction Co. and Russell Fisk, former Village Clerk from 1955 until 1967, who is now retired, advised the Village Board that he had previously discussed with Trustee Sinclair the possibility of the annexation of the area south of Foster Street West bordering on Stafford Road. In addition, he commented that he had been working with the Industrial Group, Fred Alderman and others with the anticipated hope that water might be a possibility in this area of the town, providing annexation can be accomplished. The biggest problem or person raising the most objection to this would be Harold Lehman located on the west side of Stafford Road. Mr. Roche and Mr. Fisk commented that they had discussed the possibility of annexation from Stafford Road to Canandaigua Road (to include the area now in the Canandaigua Road Water District in the Town of Palmyra). However, they commented these people in the Canandaigua Road area are not as anxious to be annexed in that they do have water.

Survey Request:

Trustee Leysath asked Mr. Roche to get a survey of 51% of the property owners to ascertain how many would be interested in annexation. Following this, the board would then obtain information as to when water and sewerage might be available should the property be annexed.

C. Richardson - Re. Employee Life Ins.: Charles Richardson, New York Life, discussed with the board the issuance of a \$5,000.00 Term policy on the life of 22 full time employees of the village. He advised that such a blanket coverage would cost about \$120.00 per month for the 22 employees.

Court Stenog: Paul Rubery, Police Justice, advised the board that he would like to ask the board to provide for the services of a court stenographer at approximately \$2.00/hr. which would average around 25 hrs. per month. Mr. Rubery felt that an appropriation of \$600.00 in the forthcoming budget would be sufficient.

United Fund Drive: Trustee Leysath questioned if it would be possible for the Highway Department to place flagholders on the light poles so that the committee for the United Fund Drive might have access to placing flags during their annual spring campaign. The flagholders have been purchased by the United Fund Committee and once in place would be a permanent fixture. Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried to grant permission to the highway crew to take care of this providing it does not interfere with the work that is planned for the spring.

Cemetery Road: When the sanitary sewer and storm sewer were installed across the newer development of the village cemetery, the Northwest section, adjacent to the main entrance on Vienna Street, the paved road of the cemetery was torn up and replaced only with gravel. It is the thinking of the board that this roadway should be replaced with blacktop and the cost of same charged to storm sewer and sanitary sewer.

Jr. Narcotic Court:

Visitor Fred Alderman commented that he had been asked to inquire af the Village Board if a Junior Narcotic Court might be established. The consensus of the board emphasized that at this time they were all of the opinion that such a court could and would not be formed.

United Nations Day: A letter addressed to the Mayor, David Nussbaumer, asked that in preparation of United Nations Day October 24, 1971, that the Village Board appoint a distinguished citizen to be Chairman for this day. Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried that Robert Knapp be so appointed and his name sent forthwith to the United States National Chairman.

Motion was made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried to approve the plans and proceed with obtaining proper specs drawn for bidding of the work.

Cable T.V.

A letter received by the clerk advised the Village Board that Information Transfer, Inc., the cable T.V. who has obtained a non-exclusive franchise for the installation of cable T.V. within the village limits anticipate installation of their lines in the early fall of 1971.

Election Inspect.:

The following appointed village election inspectors, Betty Stubbings, Mary Pfifer, and Margaret Carroll asked cooperation of the village board in setting up rules governing registration and election for the village. The following seemed to be of prime importance to the ladies:
(1) Asked that the room be cleared following elections to make it possible for the inspectors to carefully and I be accurately tabulate the results; (2) Suggested that the village registration should go back to the people, rather than the inspectors who copy the names from the previous year's book, trying to ascertain who has died, moved away, etc.; (3) Residency definition (is now outlined in a new book published by the Conference of Mayors); (4) Village boundaries defined; and lastly (5) a sheet of instructions, which may be outlined in the book published by the Conference of Mayors.

Pol. Just. Ann. Rpt.:

The annual report of the Police Justice, Paul Rubery, Attorney, was viewed by the board. Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried to accept this report.

Conf. of Mayors Workshop:

Notice received from the Conference of Mayors advised that there will be a workshop at the Randolph House, Syracuse, on April 17th which would be pertinent to mayors and newly elected trustees for a \$10.00 registration fee to include lunch from 9:00 A.M. until 4:30 P.M. Motion by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried to allow the mayor and any other village office to attend, with expenses to be paid by the village.

Dump:

Siegel Gilfus, caretaker of the Village Dump on Garnsey Road for the last year, talked with the board relative to a new contract which would be in the amount of \$2,000.00 for the trenching, excavating and extra work required by the State Health Department to keep the dump in an acceptable condition. In addition, the village would hire Mr. Gilfus for an annual salary of \$3.500.00 to be caretaker of the dump to include daily covering and any work required on a daily basis. Und this arrangement, Mr. Gilfus would be an employe of the Village of Palmyra with Social Security deducted. Mr. Gilfus commented that many of the neighbors adjacent to the dump had commented that many users of the dump did not tie down the debris that they were carting to the dump. Consequently, litter fell by the wayside, cluttering up the lawns of the neighbors. It may be well, he emphasized, for the village to consider insisting that all material being transported to the dump be

Mr. Valentine advised that the contracts with the state are being processed, but would take about 10 weeks before an official notice will be sent so that we might in turn process the expenditures that have been incurred to date. Narcot. :

Budget

Robert Disney discussed with the Village Board a proposed budget for the Narcotic Council for the forthcoming year which would amount to \$6,184.00 which would incorporate a "Hot Line", the rental of a "storefront" and "professional counselling. Chairman Valentine commented that all of the items would be 100% refunded by the State of New York. The board asked him to obtain more specific information as they did not feel justified in sanctioning some of the expenses so indicated.

Court Stenog.:

Attorney and Police Justice Rubery discussed with the Village Board the possible retention of a court stenographer to assist the Police Justice in recording fines, bail, etc. Police Justice Rubery commented that at the present time, a patrolman will or does handle part of the work but quite often he is called to the Police Office or out to the street which makes it often difficult to give his full attention to the matter.

Stenog.:

Court agreed to place funds in the budget for such an appointment. Attorney Rubery further commented that a man had mentioned to him that he would like to have the position but would like the village to send him to Justice School rather than paying him a salary or to do the job for the time involved. The matter will be taken under advisement but it would appear that unless the person were appointed Acting Police Justice, with no training in the field, he would then be obliged to attend Justice School at the expense of the village.

Press. Sustain. Valve:

A letter from Woodward Associates, Webster, N.Y. relative to the bids submitted on March 24, 1971 indicated that low bidder, Clohessy, Inc., in the amount of \$10,355.00 had met the specifications. Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath, that the low bid of Clohessy, Inc. in the amount of \$10,355.00 for a Pressure Sustaining Valve to be installed in the Filter Plant on Spring Street be accepted. Motion carried.

Bloom Estate: Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried to allow Attorney Nesbitt to intercede in behalf of the Village of Palmyra to deed over to the heirs of Sarah M. Bloom, 324 Prospect Drive, that portion of a triangle which has been maintained by Mrs. Bloom, during her lifetime which was originally a part of Sexton Street and Catherine Street but when Prospect Drive was so named and the road bed was re-routed to become more of a curve rather than a right angle, that section adjacent to the property of Sarah M. Bloom nestled in the foothill of Sexton Park, was never properly deeded over to Mrs. Bloom.

The attached resolutions to incorporate an additional death benefit to the 1/60th Retirement Plan to provide for a maximum of \$20,000.00 death benefit for all enrolled in the plan whose salary equals or exceeds \$6,500.00 was promulgated by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried. G.&E. Request: New York State Electric & Gas asked permission to break the surface on Lots #14, 25 and 24 on Aldrich Drive. Motion made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried to grant this request.




