U.S.O. Day

Mayor Nussbaumer asked approval of the Village Board to proclaim February 4, 1971, as requested by the United Service Organizations, Inc., as U.S.O. Day in conjunction with the 30th anniversary of the founding of this worthwhile organization.

Police Report:

On motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried, the approval of the Police Report for the month of January, 1971 was noted. The most glaring item in the report was the desecration of the American Flag which had been presented to the Village of Palmyra by Representative Frank Horton in the fall of 1970, to be flown atop the steel pole. Other matters were 119 complaints, and 18 accidents along with 11 illegal parking. Total fines and bail forfeitures for motor vehicle and criminal offenses totaled \$80.00.

Park-0-Meter:

Discussion of repairing broken meters in the basement and replacing heads on meter spikes. Clerk showed a folder from Park-A-Meter which indicated that a mechanism could be re-manufactured for \$17.00, for \$3.00 ea., cleaning etc., for \$1.50 ea., and cases re-manufactured for \$9.50 ea. Board felt the matter should be tabled at this time.

R. Disney,: Rep. of C. of C.

Robert Disney, representative in behalf of the Palmyra Chamber of Commerce talked with the board relative to a brochure the Chamber would like to consider publishing. The brochure would be in color (4 color), which would emphasize the unique features of the Village of Palmyra. The cost to print would be about \$1,200.00. The initial cost is high in that the plates would be around \$600.00, but would thereafter be the property of the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce is providing \$300.00, Garlock, Inc. have promised \$300.00, the Town of Palmyra have indicated they would provide \$300.00 and it would be apropos if the Village of Palmyra might consider \$300.00 as its share, according to Mr. Disney. Mayor Nussbaumer advised Mr. Disney that they would consider \$300.00, but this would not be a firm promise until after all the figures have been evaluated for the forthcoming budget.

Leak (?):

Waterline H. VanEtten, Operator of the Water & Sewer Plants, advises the board that he definitely felt that there was a water leak in the filtered water lines as there has been a loss of 100,000 gals. in a 24 hour period. He advised that he had driven around the village hoping to find some spot that appeared to be drenched, but had found nothing. Attorney Nesbitt commented that if there were even a leak beneath one of the brooks in the village, it would be very difficult to view.

Macedon Meter:

The Macedon Water Meter which was previously used by the Creek Area Section is no longer in use by these residents in that they now have their own water line from the Monroe Water Authority. Clerk was asked to write to the Town of Macedon to ascertain if they would consider turning the mater around so that the Village of Palmyra might use the line should the occasion arise.

N.Y.S. Elec. & Gas :

Mr. William Wilson of the New York State Electric & Gas Corp. conferred with the board relative to up-dating all the streets that have not been re-lighted with the mercury lights. The plan as outlined in 1967 allowed the board to choose which streets they wished to up-date with funds that might be available in the annual budget. With the inception of the utility tax, which would increase the income of the village approximately \$7,000.00 per year, it would beem apropos to funnel this money to

updating the balance of the streets not finished. Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath, and carried to so inform the New York State Electric & Gas to proceed to up-date the entire village as proposed in the plan of 1967.

Trailer Hitch:

H. VanEtten, advised the board that in the past one of the neighbors, Vincent Craft, on Spring Street, had been using his small plow to also plow out the Filter Plant. It would be his suggestion that a trailer-hitch be purchased so that he might shuttle the plow at the sewer plant to the filter plant.

Purchase Hitch

Motion was made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried to allow Mr. VanEtten to purchase a used trailer hitch for a cost of \$95.00.

Ambulance Agree:

The following motion was made by Trustee Leysath, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried: RESOLVED: The Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra grant the authority to Mayor David M. Nussbaumer, to sign an agreement between the Village of Palmyra and the PALMYRA EMERGENCY VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SERVICE, INC. which recognizes the need for the acquisition of equipment and facilities necessary for its operation, including housing in a strategic spot in the Village of Palmyra. (Agreement a part of these minutes.)

Snow-Mobiles: Attorney Nesbitt informed the board that he had been working on an ordinance relative to the off-limits for snowmobiles on sidewalks. According to the Conservation Law, Attorney Nesbitt commented, sidewalks are a part of the roadway. Therefore, any snowmobile on the sidewalk is in violation of the law.

Typewriter: Clk. Ofc.

Trustee Sinclair commented that it would be his suggestion that the clerk be allowed to purchase another typewriter for approximately \$355.00 from Arcadia Business Machines with a 15' carriage inasmuch as Mrs. Phyllis Dickinson has been providing her own typewriter during the last three years she has been employed in the clerk's office.

Attorney Henry B. Nesbitt commented to the Village Board that it would be his suggestion that the board should consider reviewing periodically the exemptions, such as firemen, church property, etc. along with the assessor. It would be his opinion that churches, in particular, should be asked annually to give a list of their church property, so indicating those pieces which are being used solely for church purposes. This category would include Sunday School Rooms along with the church proper but should exclude such pieces of property where there are no church activities. Clerk was asked to contact the assessor to brief the board at the next village board meeting relative to the current exemptions.

Junk Cars:

Attorney Nesbitt advised that he had drawn the proper affidavit to cite Conrad Skorc for the unkemt area around his garage and property with dismantled, unused cars.

Update Vil. Hall:

Paul Evans, a local contractor known for the building and repairing of primarily inside work, talked with the board relative to the possibility of remodeling the expanse of hallway in the Village Hall. It would be his suggestion to wall up the stairs, wall up the open hallway at the foot of the stairs leading to the Clerk's Office, install a small door to be open only during working hours, lower the ceiling in both areas, and provide an outside door on the east of the building directly into the snorkel room. In addition, the Police Chief and Fire Chief's rooms would be reversed thus allowing easier access for both departments to the lock-up and the fire rooms. The former Police Chief Office would then be remodeled.

Cost:

The approximate cost for this would be about \$7,400.00. In addition, it would be the thinking at this time to improve the rest room facilities, thereby increasing the cost to around \$10,000.00.

Fire Dept.:

Fire Chief James C. O'Brien, along with Fire Department Members, Harry White and Richard Culver talked with the board of the need for a new tanker. Chief O'Brien commented that tentative specs for the tanker to hold 1,000 gals. of water would have a single stage pump. The chassis would cost around \$10,763 and the bodyyabout \$23,000. In addition a "Stang Gun" which would have a nozzle handled by one man along with a radio and ladders would complete the outfit. Chief O'Brien commented that the Association has agreed to contribute \$3,000.00 for the ladder, radio and "stang gun". (In other words a new tanker for use primarily in the Town of Palmyra where there is no water available, would cost \$34,000.00).

Ski-Doos:

Attorney Nesbitt commented that during the snow emergency the rules outlined by the Conservation Department which allowed Snowmobiles access on the streets in an emergency were valid.

Emergency Oxyg.Rules:

Trustee Leysath commented that the rules and regulations which had been drawn for the purpose of the Emergency Oxygen Squad had not been returned to him signed as agreed.

Woodward: Comments Up-dat. Sew.

O. Sniedze, representative of K.G. Woodward Associates, Consulting Engineers, commented that the papers had been sent to Albany to the New York State Department of Conservation for their final approval, they had not received official notification of their stamped approval. However, Mr. Sniedze implied that this was just a formality and that they, Woodward Assoc., are expecting to be able to advertise for bids for the up-dating of the disposal plant to include chlorination facilities the end of March or the first of April. 1971. or the first of April, 1971.

Pressure: Sustain. Valve

Mr. Sniedze spoke briefly relative to a pressure sustaining valve to be installed at the Filter Plant so that pressure can be controlled. The valve, he commented, would have a continuous recording device. The necessary material would be ready for bidding, if the board so desires Woodward Associates to draw up the legal notice.

The board seemed to feel that the matter should be discussed with Attorney Nesbitt prior to recommending that Woodward Assoc. send in the legal notice for bidding. The clerk was asked to check with Attorney Nesbitt. (Note: Clerk discussed the matter with Attorney Nesbitt, who advised Woodward could prepare the proper legal for the newspaper.)

Water Lines:

Mr. Sniedze and the board discussed the present water line. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that eventually a new water line will have to be installed and one laid parallel to the present line would appear to be the most feasible rather than attempting to repair the current line which has many valves which could be turned off but due to the age of the line (installed about 1935) many of the valves might not be turned back on. Expansion Wat. Tank:

Further discussion of the village water by Mr. Sniedze revealed that an expansion of the water tank will be an eventual expenditure to include pump, new filters, piping into the filter plan with a cost of around \$70,000.00 to \$100,000.00 in order to provide from \$400,000,000 to 600 million gallons. This would upothecapacity about 50%. He reiterated that the state would provide some funds. A preliminary report to the State Health Dept. would cost via engineer's fees about \$1,500.00.

Water: The village water map has not been updated for quite some time to include new developments and annexations. The following motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by

Mr. Roche replied that while he was in Buffalo recently, a call was made to Washington which re-assures that the Village of Palmyra contract with Urban Renewal is reserved and funds have been placed aside for our village. Mr. Roche remarked that undoubtedly the Main Street frontage will not be touched. Mention was made by Mr. Roche regarding the possible purchase of the lumber yard in that due to the heavy snow storm recently, extensive damage was done to the store. The owner, J. Cleason, approached Mr. Roche to ascertain whether he should do the required repairs or make temporary repairs. W. Roche Comments: William Roche, Urban Renewal Director commented that the group was gathered to discuss the Main Street Urban Renewal He said that Canal Street bounded by Market and William Streets are the only spots in the current plan.
Main Street, as such, is no longer in the plan. He emphasized that parking is a prime detriment for Urban Renewal on Main Street. The Planning Board had previously approved with various conditions, that a year should elapse before the following could be torn down or touched:

Rubery and Cuyler Block

East Side of Market Street Sybil Phelps property on Market Street Johnsox House on Market Street

R. Kennedy: Mr. Kennedy interjected that the Village of Palmyra has a reservation in the amount of \$900,000. At the present time there are no new projects being approved by the office of HUD. It was his opinion that we should not cast aside this appropriated amount, but should avail ourselves of it.

M. Collie:

Mr. Collie reaffirmed a previous statement that the problem of rejuvenation of the Main Street stems from the fact there is not ample parking for customers. It is a known there is not ample parking for customers. It is a known fact, he said, that people will go to the new plazas, park in a spot which could be considered perhaps two blocks from the store that they might wish to shop, but as long as they have the "beauty" of the front of the stores to look at as they walk to the desired store, no one complains. But, -- try to get people to park in back of the present stores on Main Street on the south side where there is ample parking, walk up Cuyler to the Main Street Business area, and they are bound to complain that the parking is too far from the stores. Collie said that he would gladly tear down his store, move it back, if some arrangement could be provided for in front parking.
