Ackart: Whether or not it will be feasible for Garlock to use canal water, will determine in a large sense the Village's action of connecting with the county.

Green: If the Village were to shut down the line, would the Village loose the rights to the line?

Ackart volunteered to check on this matter.

Etten: By readjusting the pressure valve, water can be conserved.

Adjourn: Meeting adjourned at 3:15 P.M.

Present: Mayor Sidney J. Fitzgerald, and Trustees David McGuire, Warner Strong, Lloyd A. Green, and Mary Lou Wilson.
Village Attorney Laura Jane Poyzer was absent due to illness.

Vouchers: Motion by Trustee Strong, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, to approve payment of the vouchers in the amount of \$15,170.74 less a voucher in the amount od \$300.00 payable to James DePoint, Esq. for services to the Housing Authority. Board requested further information as to the proper dates that his services were rendered.

Minutes: Motion by Trustee Strong, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, to accept the minutes of the previous meeting.

Urb.Ren.: Trustee Strong questioned the reason for signing the Cooperation Agreement again. Mayor Fitzgerald commented that there could be a charge back if there is no housing developed. At the present time it appears that there are only about 20 out of a needed 60 who are interested in housing. The plan is the same as when the grant was obtained. Trustee Strong reiterated that we should be informed what the village's responsibility will be financially at the end of 12/31/75.

Mayor Fitzgerald suggested that the board would observe the two 2 Min. Silence: minute silence before proceeding further with the meeting.

Wayne Ackart, representative of Lozier's, Rochester, N.Y., Water for that the Church of Latter Day Saints, Mormons, had requested Mormons: permission to tap into the raw water line at Curran Road. Mr. Ackart advised that the Village of Palmyra could spare water, the

Lozier amount they desire -- 100 gals. per minute.

Comments Basically, he advised, a valve could be changed at Garlock; secondly, the Village does have a contract with the Town of Macedon for emergency supply water -- 200 gals. per minute.

Supply If it were necessary to use this supply, the Village would have to Emergency charge the Mormon Church in proportion.

The Village of Manchester, according to Mr. Ackart would probably have the first option. Mr. Ackart volunteered to contact Paul Russell, Engineer for the Mormon Church, from Harnish & Lookup. Information that he would ask would be the exact amount of potable water needed (this would not mean filtered water).

Trustee Wilson questioned if it would be possible to supply potable water to both Manchester and the Mormon Church. Mr. Ackart replied that it would be possible.

Main & Cdga. Sts.

Curb Mr. Ackart was asked to confer with the New York State Electric & Cutback: Gas, the New York Telephone Co., and John Edinger, of the New York State Dept. of Transportation relative to a "slicing off" of the southeast and southwest corners of Canandaigua and Main Streets to facilitate the easier movement of trailer trucks around the corners. All wires would have to be moved back. Village crews would install new curb, preferably granite. The N.Y.S. Dept. of Transportation would cooperate in putting in a new pavement. Ackart advised that they will have to prepare drawings of the proposal. It may be necessary to contact the Episcopal Church for an easement in order to cut this back. Mr. Ackart advised that the telephone lines be placed underground.

Co.Wat. Study: 3-5 yrs. Away:

Hiram VanEtten, Operator of the Water Plant, commented that the Wayne County Water System is, undoubtedly, 3 to 5 years away. While previously, he added, that he felt we should tie in with the county and ultimately this will probably be done, at the present time, in order to properly and adequately supply the needs of the village, it would be aproposed shout a year added to the present time of the changes as originally proposed shout a year consider making the changes as originally proposed about a year ago, meaning additional filters in the water plant.
Wayne Ackart, Lozier Engineers, reiterated and concurred with Mr. VanEtten's statements.

Plant:

Repair Filter Plant:

The following resolution was proposed by Trustee Strong, 2nd

by Trustee Green: Filter

WHEREAS, the Village of Palmyra has delayed the remodeling of the Filter Plant on Spring Street for the additional filters and ventilation system, due to the possibility of Wayne County forming a Water Supply System in the northwest section of Wayne County, namely, Ontario, Williamson, Walworth, Marion, and Palmyra, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Village of Palmyra revaluate the situation in view of the fact that it may be three to five years before it would be possible to obtain water from the above mentioned system, and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, Lozier Engineers, Rochester, N.Y. be instructed to prepare the necessary bid proposals for the remodeling of the Filter Plant as soon as possible, to include pumps, motors and electrical system and any other such com-

ponents as may be necessary for an efficient workable filter system.

Badger Meter Service: Mr. VanEtten advised that Badger Meter are offering for rental use a portable testing mechanism at a cost of \$50.00/large meter. There are about a dozen or less large meters that should be tested for accuracy. Motion by Trustee Strong, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, that Badger Meter should be contacted for rental of this machine for testing these large meters.

Signs:

Zoning Officer, Bruce Wideman, commented that he had talked with 98% of the side street merchants, who were all in accord with the proposed small sign that he had shown the board previously. As a business might change, new slots could be inserted. Wording would be such as to denote the type of business, such as "Hardware". Four (4) signs would be needed with writing on both sides. Motion by Trustee Green, 2nd by Trustee Strong and carried, to authorize Zoning Officer Wideman to have prepared the type of sign that he had shown.

Mormon Church re: Water:

Mayor Fitzgerald commented that Mr. Pickett, Chairman of the Grounds Committee, for the Church of Latter Day Saints, Hill Cumorah, advised that they would be willing to agree to using or obtaining only the potable water for their sanitary needs, and not requesting further water for irrigation. If such were requested they would need for 6 acres about 1" per week. would be no crops or cattle.
Water Plant Operator, Hiram VanEtten, commented that at the point in Curran Road where the church would propose to connect to the Village line, it is to be noted the lowest spot in the main. They, Mormon Church, would be required to pump to Hill Cumorah, as the water would not flow by gravity.

Weykman Bldg.:

Miss Laura Jane Poyzer, Village Attorney, advised by a memo to the clerk that she had contacted the Wayne County Attorney,
Larry Mooney. She indicated that a check should be made to
determine from the Wayne County Clerk's Office, who last filed
a record of a deed. After this is done, according to the
ordinance, the property owner can either be served personally,
or by mail, or by other substitute notice. It would be the board's decision as to what they wish to do.

Salisbury Motion by Trustee Strong, 2nd by Trustee Wilson, to authorize Security Mayor Fitzgerald to sign the Security Agreement with Salisbury who are supplying the squad car for the Fire Department. ment:

Fire Dept. Member: On motion by Trustee McGuire, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, the name of Phillip A. Retan, 1172 Vienna Street, was accepted as a trainee for the Village of Palmyra Fire Department, following the recommendation of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

Comm. Ctr .: Trustee Wilson commented that James Campbell, Community Center Director, advised that there are several broken windows, which cannot be reached by him to repair. Clerk advised she would contact village crews to have windows repaired, if possible, by them. If not, other assistance would be sought. Trustee Strong commented that the Community Center should be a Town responsibility. Discussion centered around the possibility of leasing the Fair Association Bldg. Trustee Wilson intimated that the Fair Association would be reluctant to become involved in this type of venture, in view of the fact that they were denied a building permit to erect a barn for display of cattle, etc.

Trustee Strong commented that the Fire Department needs a facility to house their equipment. Consequently, he feels any unused village funds should be used for this department.

Plan. Brd.: Daniel Pope, Chairman of the Planning Board, presented two proposed drawings of signs recommended by the Planning Board for side street merchants. Planning Board seemed to feel that free standing signs would not be feasible. Would be better to attach to a building. Discussion of visibility on buildings.

C-3 Dist. Amend:

Chairman Pope advised that the planning board had recommended that the uses in the C3 District on East Main Street should be expended. Board unanimously agreed that the letter be referred to Village Attorney, Laura Jane Poyzer, for drafting a Local Law to make the changes or amendments.

Raise Sr.Cit. Exemp:

Highlights of the report indicated 140 complaints investigated, 4 arrests for public intoxication, 6 arrests for petit larceny and 6 snowmobile violations. Total fines and bail forfeitures for motor vehicle and criminal arrests amounted to \$250.00.

Bids scheduled to be opened at this time were cancelled. Conference between Miss Laura Jane Poyzer, Esq., Village Attorney; Wayne Ackart, Lozier, Engineers; Hiram VanEtten, and Clerk, Theresa P.
