Mr. Campbell and Mr. Cunningham questioned if it would be possible to allow village crews to assist in scraping down the Little League Field, located southwest of the Hyde Park School. They commented that other leagues have fine fields but this one needs to be graded. The discussion in summary seemed to indicate that it would not be feasible to try to do much to the field this spring and in all probability would be better to wait until the Little League season might be over before starting any grading and re-seeding.

Fire Assoc. Appoint. : On recommendation of the Palmyra Firemen's Association, the following were suggested for appointment - - James C. O'Brien, Chief, Richard Culver, 1st Asst. Chief, Harry White, 2nd Asst. Chief, Kermit Jones, Fire Commissioner for 3 year term. On motion by Trustee Mc Guire, 2nd by Trustee Nussbaumer and carried, the above appointments were approved.

Police : Phone Hook-up : For more than a decade the Palmyra Police Department phone has been a base hookup with Curley's Gas Station, East Main Street. Due to a change in their functions, it was deemed advisable to ask the cooperation of the Wayne County Sheriff's Office to answer calls when no one is in the police office. The change-over has been made and calls will now be funnelled through the Sheriff if the local police are not in the office.

G.Kingsley: Trustee Schwing advised that he had a lengthy conversation with Gerald Kingsley, 234 West Foster Street, who has objected to the run-off of snow, water, etc. through his yard, which is located at the corner of so-named Laurentian Drive, if it were so dedicated as a street. Trustee Schwing informed him that there were many complications in this avenue and most of them belonged to Ernest Lawrence, the original owner of this piece of land.

Girl Scout Project: Mayor L. Green had previously mentioned that the Girl Scouts desired a community project and he had suggested that they paint the iron spike fence in front of the Village Park. They have now agreed this would be a worthwhile project.

March 16, 1970

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Rpt. on Landfill: Mayor Green, and Trustees Nussbaumer and McGuire informed the board that they had attended 2 meetings regarding the proposed landfill. Former Mayor and Supervisor, Richard C. McGonigal has been appointed by the Wayne County Board of Supervisors to head up a committee to promote the landfill. Mayor Green read a letter which he proposed to be published in the Palmyra-Courier in behalf of the landfill, the contents of which were approved by the board.

Tree Removal Contract: The contract drawn up by Attorney Paul Rubery between the Village of Palmyra and Empire Tree Surgeons, Newark, N.Y. for the removal of approximately 31 trees and 31 stumps, for a fee of \$1,750.00 was signed by Mayor Green in behalf of the Village of Palmyra, on motion by Trustee Schwing, 2nd by Trustee McGuire and carried. (Contract filed with Contracts & Agreements.)

Cham. of Commerce: A letter from the Palmyra Chamber of Commerce requesting funds to be placed in the village budget 1970-71 to assist the Chamber in publishing a brochure, depicting the places of interest in the village, etc. was read. Motion by Trustee Nussbaumer, 2nd by Trustee Schwing and carried denied the insertion of any funds in the forthcoming budget for the purpose they so requested.

Pal-Mac Pals Request: The Pal-Mac Pals who are a group of adults interested in camping, asked permission to clean-up the Village Park on Main Street on Sunday, April 26, 1970 as their project in connection with keeping camping and camp-sites beautiful. The board unanimously agreed to allow them to share this activity in the Village Park.

Broken Hydrant: Fire Chief James O'Brien had advised that a hydrant was broken on East Vienna Street outside the Village Limits. Board directed the clerk to write the supervisor of the Town of Palmyra to have this replaced in that there is no water district in this area and is their responsibility.

R. Disney: Robert Disney in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce talked to the board in relation to the appropriation of funds for their brochure. The Board informed him that a decision in the negative had been made.

Resolutions: The following resolution was made by Trustee Schwing, 2d by Trustee McGuire and carried, to wit:-

Section 1. The construction of additions to and the reconstruction of the existing sewage treatment plant of the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, to provide secondary treatment facilities, to increase the capacity thereof to 500,000 gallons per day, and to provide chlorination facilities, together with incidental improvements necessary therefore, is hereby authorized for said Village at a maximum estimated cost of \$635,000.00.

Section 2. The plan for the financing of such maximum estimated cost of such maximum estimated cost of

ed cost consists of the issuance of \$635,000.00 serial bonds of said Village hereby authorized to be issued therefore pursuant to the Local Finance Law, provided, however, that there shall be applied in reduction of the amount of serial bonds to be issued the amount of any Federal or State grants-in-aid received for the specific object or purpose herein authorized.

Section 3. It is hereby determined as follows:

a) That subdivision 4 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law applies to the aforesaid specific object or purpose, and that the period of probable usefulness thereof is forty years; and

b) That the proposed maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will be in excess of five years; and

c) That, pursuant to item (1) of subdivision 3 of paragraph d of Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, no down payment is required in connection with the issuance of the bonds herein authorized.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year.

Police Depart.: A recent letter to the Editor of the Palmyra Courier Journal from Howard Smith, Fayette, Street, gave the impression that the Palmyra Police Department was unconcerned and lax in answering a telephone call to that department relative to a break-in on a Sunday afternoon at his storage property on Spring Street. Officer James Smith and Police Chief Donald Henry were asked to give their version of the happenings that afternoon.

Officer Smith : Officer Smith advised that he had had a call from Howard Smith regarding the break-in in H. Smith's warehouse. At the same time Officer Smith had a young lady in the office regarding a matter. (This could be substantiated by his reporting in the Day-Book). Later (5 or 10 minutes), Officer Smith continued, he went to Howard Smith's home. No one was there. At this point Officer Smith went home to his supper. In the interim, Howard Smith took the boys to their parents. All the boys were under 16.

Letter for Paper: A letter proposed by Officer Smith for publishing in the Village paper as a reply to Howard Smith's was read. It was agreed that the letter be taken to Henry B. Nesbitt, an attorney, for his comments before publishing in the newspaper.

Paul Cherry: Paul Cherry, manager of the Ben Franklin Store, as primary spokesman for a group, including Donald Chase, Sheldon Knapp, and Carlton Dennie and Martin Collie, advised the board that there is a critical situation on Main Street. It appears that a group of young people are creating a disturbance in the evening in the downtown area. Customers are being harassed to the point that some are hesitant to venture out on the street after making their purchase. Don Chase wondered if the village had any ordinance regulating the number of people allowed to congregate outside on the sidewalk area. A possible solution might be a curfew for young people. It would appear that the RED BARRON is an "attractive hazard". The consensus of opinion seemed to be that an ordinance should be adopted and a patrolman on foot during the early evening hours, especially on Thursday and Friday nights might be helpful.

Cemetery: Trustee Rienstra advised that the Empire Tree Surgeons had looked at the stumps in the cemetery area and would remove for \$18.00 each while Baker would charge \$17.50 per hour.

Cemetery Foreman: Trustee-Elect Donald Sinclair advised that he had talked with Eugene Sharp relative to the position as cemetery caretaker. He intimated that he might be interested for \$135.00/wk. for 48 wks. plus hospitalization for a year. No decision could be reached until Sharp would definitely commit himself.

Hwy.Dept.: Highway Foreman, Raymond Smith, advised that the Syrian who works for the highway department is an excellent worker and very willing to do what is asked of him. 

Approximately 38 - 45 citizens. (Both Town and Village Residents as well as some from the vicinity of Marion.)

Mayor Nuss- Newley elected Mayor David Nussbaumer introduced the Village Board informing the gathering that officially as of noon this date they had taken office. In introducing Robert Peterson, he informed the group that he (Peterson) is the Chairman of the Wayne County Planning Board. Mr. Peterson showed slides to the group which indicated that there is approximately 100,000,000 tons of refuse per day in the United States. Various types of disposal plants were shown, the least expensive and most practical for Wayne County would be a Sanitary Land Fill. To adequately maintain a Sanitary Landfill the following would be required:

Requirements for Landfill

1. Landfill - must be filled every day.
2. Wire Fences - keep papers from flying into neighboring fields.
3. Full-time caretaker.
4. Lock when not in use.
5. Access-way would be easy for trucks.
6. Compact structure (may or may not be needed).

R. Peterson Comments: After Mr. Peterson showed the slides, he advised that in order to bring the Village of Palmyra dump up to the standards as set by the New York State Department of Health, the cost would be approximately \$50,000.00. At the present time, he reiterated there are 13 dump areas in Wayne County. If Wayne County were to assume the responsibility of dump areas, there are 3 sites that might be procured for use. A user fee would or might be charged at 50¢/cubic yard to defray operating cost of approximately \$150,000.00 per year; The cost to the Village of Palmyra for its share of the repayment of the \$30,000.00 Bond issue would be about \$2,800.00 per year for 15 years.

Possible Cost:

Dump Anything: Mr. Peterson further advised that everything could be dumped, except cars, this would include old refrigerators, tires, limbs, etc., and any other items which now are sometimes questionable. Canneries are planning to "de-water" their refuse. A total cost of \$415,000.00 would cover the cost of land for 3 dump areas, fence, equipment, fill etc.

General Discuss: Several citizens posed questions as to the present operation of the village dump, citing that they could not see why the present dump was not or could not be made acceptable to the State requirements, to which Mr. Peterson replied, that because of the sharp drop-off, it is not possible to adequately cover the dump as it should be. Another question followed, if the new dumps are approved, what would happen to the present dump to which Peterson replied that it would be adequately filled in and closed.

Adjourn: Mayor Nussbaumer closed the hearing at 9:05 P.M. informing the group that they were welcome to talk with individuals but the public information meeting would be closed.
