## ORDER DIRECTING THE ABATEMENT OF NUISANCE

There having been presented to this Board of Health, the report of Dr. James D. Bramer, Health Officer of the Village of Palmyra, New York, dated August 31st, 1951, a report of an alleged nuisance on the premises designated No. 132 Gates Street, in the Village of Palmyra, New York, together with a copy of a written complaint made to him as such health officer, and said health officer in said report having set forth that the condition complained of and which he investigated was in his opinion a public hazard and a nuisance to public health for the reasons set forth in his said report of August 31, 1951; and

This Board of Health having met on September 6th, 1951 and examined said report and the complaint on which same was based, and after due deliberation, this Board of Health having determined that it appeared that a nuisance dangerous to health existed on said premises designated No. 132 Gates Street, did through its President give written notice to Howard Young, the owner of said premises, and Emerson Curtis, the tenant occupying said premises, of the conditions found to exist on said premises and that said conditions constituted a nuisance dangerous to health, and directing said Howard Young and said Emerson Curtis to appear before the Board of Health of this village at 7 o'clock in the afternoon (D.S.T.) on September 25th, 1951, to show cause why such condition should not be declared a nuisance to health, and an order for its abatement issue; and a copy of said notice having been duly served on said Howard Young and said Emerson Curtis and due proof of the service of said notice having been filed, and

The Board of Health of the Village of Palmyra, New York, having duly met on September 25th, 1951 at 7 o'clock in the afternoon (D.S.T.) and said Howard Young and said Emerson Curtis both having appeared in person, and the Board of Health having

OFFICIAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT ON THE HEALTH OF THE VILLAGE OF

There having been presented to this Board of Health, the report of Dr. James E. Bremer, Health Officer of the Village of Yonkers, dated August 31st, 1931, a report of an inspection of the premises located at No. 133 Gates Street, in the Village of Yonkers, New York, together with a copy of a written complaint made to him as such Health Officer, and said Health Officer in said report having set forth that the condition of said premises was such as to constitute a nuisance and a hazard to public health for the reasons set forth in his said report of August 31, 1931; and

This Board of Health having met on September 8th, 1931 and examined said report and the conditions on which same was based, and after due deliberation, this Board of Health having determined that it appeared that a nuisance dangerous to health existed on said premises located at No. 133 Gates Street, and through its President give written notice to Howard Young, the owner of said premises, and Arthur G. Gable, the tenant occupying said premises, of the conditions found to exist on said premises and that said conditions constituted a nuisance dangerous to health, and directing said Howard Young and said Arthur G. Gable to appear before the Board of Health of this Village at 7 o'clock in the afternoon (P.M.) on September 23rd, 1931, to show cause why said conditions should not be declared a nuisance to health, and an order for its abatement issued; and a copy of said notice having been duly served on said Howard Young and said Arthur G. Gable and due proof of the service of said notice having been made, and

and

The Board of Health of the Village of Yonkers, New York, having duly met on September 23rd, 1931 at 7 o'clock in the afternoon (P.M.) and said Howard Young and said Arthur G. Gable both having appeared in person, and the Board of Health having

examined the premises at No. 132 Gates Street and the conditions existing there, and having taken the testimony of witnesses as to said conditions, and said Howard Young having stated that such conditions should be corrected since same were a nuisance dangerous to health, and said Board of Health having adjourned to this date at 7 P. M. to enable said Howard Young to abate said conditions or arrange for the abatement of the same; and

This Board of Health having duly met on this day pursuant to said adjournment, and said Howard Young having failed to appear, and it appearing that he has not taken any steps to correct said conditions, and due deliberation having been had, it is hereby determined and decided as follows:

1. That the conditions existing for the past several months on the premises designated No. 132 Gates Street, in the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, constitute a nuisance dangerous to health, and in that there is no adequate facilities for the disposal of sewage and the overflow from the septic tank, and the sewage and overflow runs over the surface area on said premises and collects in pools which are a breeding place for mosquitoes and other germ-carrying insects, and these premises are used for play purposes by children and such conditions present the possibility of being exposed to typhoid, polio and other diseases,

Now, by virtue of the authority vested in this Board of Health pursuant to the Public Health Law of the State of New York, the Charter of the Village of Palmyra and the Sanitary Code of the State of New York, said Howard Young be and he hereby is ORDERED to abate said nuisance by cleaning and putting the present septic tank and all inlets and outlets to same in working order and constructing additional outlets for the disposal of the overflow from said tank if same be necessary in the opinion of the Health Officer, and filling in the holes and pits now existing on said

premises, and in the event a new or larger septic tank is required to adequately dispose of the sewage, that such tank be constructed or installed with proper connections to the same by October 23rd, 1951, in a manner which shall be approved by Dr. James D. Bramer, Health Officer of the Village of Palmyra, and by this Board of Health, and in the event of said Howard Young failing to comply with this order as above provided, that this Board of Health will by its own employees or otherwise enter upon said premises and suppress such nuisance and charge the expense thereof to the said Howard Young, and in the event of his failure to pay the same promptly, this Board of Health will maintain an action in the name of the Village of Palmyra to recover such expense and take any further steps it deems necessary to recover such expense.



## LEGAL NOTICE

WHEREAS, a substantial number of people patronize eating establishments in the Village of Palmyra each day, and it is essential that such establishments serve food and drink which is clean and wholesome, and that the persons who operate and work in such public eating places be in good health; and

WHEREAS, the local health officer has informed this Board that it would in his opinion after various inspections he has made of eating establishments in the Village, be in the interest of the health of this community to establish by ordinance regulations governing the operation of such eating places and the persons operating same and the persons employed therein; be it

RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York, pursuant to the authority granted to said Board of Trustees by the Charter of said Village and pursuant to the applicable statutes of the State of New York, and in the safeguarding of the general health and welfare of the residents of this community, that the following ORDINANCE be and the same is adopted and duly enacted this 28 day of December, 1951:

### ORDINANCE REGULATING RESTAURANTS

Section 1. Definitions - The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and the enforcement of this ordinance:

A. Restaurant - The term "restaurant" shall apply to and include any restaurant, coffee shop, cafe, hotel, tavern, luncheonette, sandwich shop, soda fountain and all other eating or drinking establishments in which food and drink, or either of them, is prepared, made, mixed or served to the general public, at a fixed or regularly established location or place of business for more than five (5) days in any one calendar year in the Village of Palmyra, Wayne County, New York.

B. Person - The term "person" shall apply to and include any person, co-partnership, firm, corporation or association.

C. Employee - The term "employee" shall mean any person who handles, serves, prepares or mixes any food or drink or who is employed or works, either for wages or otherwise, in any restaurant to which this ordinance applies.

D. Utensils - The term "utensils" shall include any kitchenware, tableware, glassware, cutlery, utensils, containers or other equipment with which food or drink comes in contact during storage, preparation or serving.

E. Health Officer - The term "health officer" shall include in addition to the Health Officer of the Village of Palmyra, New York, the acting health officer of said village, or the duly authorized representative of either.

Section 2. Examination and condemnation of unwholesome or adul-

terated food or drink. - Samples of food, drink, and other substances may be taken and examined by the health officer as often as may be necessary for the detection of unwholesomeness or adulteration. The health officer may condemn and forbid the sale of, or cause to be removed or destroyed, any food or drink which is unwholesome or adulterated.

Section 3. Inspection of restaurants - At least once every six (6) months, the health officer shall inspect every restaurant within the Village of Palmyra. The person operating any restaurant and any employee of such restaurant or establishment shall, upon request of the health officer, permit access to all parts of his restaurant or establishment, and shall submit to the health officer on request any and all records of food purchased.

Section 4. Sanitation requirements - All restaurants shall comply with the following items of sanitation:

A. Rooms and structures. The floors, walls, ceilings, doors and windows of all rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared or served, or in which utensils are washed shall be kept clean and in good repair, well lighted and ventilated.

B. Toilet, lavatory and water. Every restaurant shall be provided with adequate toilet and lavatory facilities for its employees. Toilet rooms shall be kept in a clean condition, in good repair, and well lighted and ventilated. Hand washing signs shall be posted in each toilet room used by employees. Adequate and convenient hand washing facilities shall be provided, including running water under pressure, soap and approved sanitary towels. The use of a common towel is prohibited. No employee shall resume work after using the toilet room without first washing his hands.

C. Construction of utensils and equipment - All multi-use utensils and all show and display cases or windows, counters, shelves, tables, refrigeration equipment, sinks, and other equipment or utensils used in connection with the operation of a restaurant shall be so constructed as to be easily cleaned and shall be kept in good repair. Utensils containing or plated with cadmium or lead shall not be used: Provided, That solder containing lead may be used for jointing.

D. Cleaning and bactericidal treatment of utensils and equipment - All equipment, including display cases or windows, counters, shelves, tables, refrigerators, stoves, hoods and sinks, shall be kept clean and free from dust, dirt, insects and other contaminating material. All cloths used by waiters, chefs, and other employees shall be clean. Single-service containers shall be used only once.

All multi-use eating and drinking utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned and effectively subjected to an approved bactericidal process after each usage. All multi-use utensils used in the preparation or serving of food and drink shall be

thoroughly cleaned and effectively subjected to an approved bactericidal process immediately following the day's operation. Drying cloths if used, shall be clean and shall be used for no other purpose.

No article, polish or other substance containing any cyanide preparation or other poisonous material shall be used for cleansing or polishing utensils.

E. Refrigeration - All readily perishable food and drink shall be kept at or below 50 degrees F. except when being prepared or served. Waste water from refrigeration equipment shall be properly disposed of.

F. Wholesomeness of food and drink - All food and drink shall be clean, wholesome, free from spoilage, and so prepared as to be safe for human consumption. All milk, fluid milk products, ice cream, and other frozen desserts shall be served from approved sources. Milk and fluid milk products shall be served in the individual original containers in which they are received from the distributor or from a bulk container equipped with an approved dispensing device: Provided, that this requirement shall not apply to cream, which may be served from the original bottle or from a dispenser approved for such service. All oysters, clams and mussels shall be from approved sources and if shucked shall be kept until used in the containers in which they were placed at the shucking plant.

G. Cleanliness of employees - All employees shall wear clean outer garments and shall keep their hands clean at all times while engaged in handling food, drink, utensils or equipment.

H. Miscellaneous - The premises of all restaurants shall be kept clean and free of litter and rubbish. None of the operations connection with a restaurant shall be conducted in any room used as living or sleeping quarters.

Section 5. Disease control. - No person who is affected with any disease in a communicable form or is a carrier of such disease shall work in any restaurant, and no restaurant shall employ any such person or any person suspected of being a carrier of such disease. If the restaurant has reasonable cause to believe that any employee has contracted any disease in a communicable form or has become a carrier of such disease, he shall notify the health officer immediately. When the health officer has reasonable cause to believe that disease or infection may be transmitted from any restaurant operator or employee, he is authorized to require any or all of the following measures: (1) the immediate exclusion of the employee from all restaurants; (2) the immediate closing of the restaurant concerned until no further danger of disease outbreak exists, in the opinion of the health officer; (3) adequate medical examination of the employee and of his associates, with such laboratory examinations as may be indicated.

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**Section 6. Penalties** - Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance, and any person who aids, abets or assists therein shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and shall stand committed until said fine be paid, but not exceeding one day for each dollar of such fine unpaid. Each violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

**Section 7. Unconstitutionality** - If any section of this ordinance, or part thereof shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby, but shall remain in full force and effect.

**Section 8. Date of Effect** - This ordinance shall take effect the 1st day of February, 1952, after due publication and posting. In accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Village of Palmyra.
