Justice Courts: Pres.Contant read a letter of a hearing in Albany by a Judiciary Committee of the Legislature, regarding a bill to dispose of all justice courts, police justices, justices of the peace, and transfer all minor cases to a county court to be held at the county seat of each county, except villages of 15,000 population, which would retain magistrates courts.

Resolution: On motion of Trustee Johnson, who moved its adoption, and seconded by Trustee Mierke:

Whereas:

The Judiciary Committee of the N.Y.State Legislature is holding a hearing in Albany N.Y. at 10.00AM on Feb.5th. 1957, for the purpose of hearings on a bill that would eliminate all local justice courts, justices of the peace, and police court justices in the state, substituting county courts to be administered by a group of regular judges, with the exception of magistrates courts in cities of 15,000 population or larger: and,

Whereas:

This village of Palmyra New York, would suffer from the loss of home rule and the lack of local justice and police courts, who are familiar with local people and their circumstances, and

Whereas:

The cost of providing police evidence in court, and transportation of such officers to a county court, and the employment of additional officers to provide protection in the village during the absence of such officers who may be witnesses, and the usual court delays and antiquated court system which was instituted in England many years ago, hidebound by impractical proceedings and red tape, and

Whereas:

The citizens of this community would be hampered in their employment and family income, caused by traveling to said county courts, causing loss of wages in addition to the cost and inconvenience of traveling to the county court, making repeated trips caused by said antiquated court proceedings, delays, adjournments and what not, over trivial matters not warranting a possible fine \$10.00, and

Whereas:

The cost to the taxpayers of this county will be greatly increased, by the establishing of a new court with a full staff of aides, lawyers, attendants, deputy sheriffs, stenographers, process servers, offices, filing clerks, and court rooms, therefor:

BE IT RESOLVED:

That this Board of Trustees appoint an attorney who is not employed in any capacity as a police justice or justice of the peace, to represent this Board of Trustees and the citizens and voters of this community at a hearing to be held in Albany N.Y. on February 5th.1957 at 10.00AM for the purpose of voicing the objections of this community to the proposed bill designed to eliminate all local courts police justices, and justices of the peace, as proposed in a bill now before the Judiciary Committee for consideration.

Be it further Resolved:

That the attorney to be appointed, shall be re-im-bursed for the expense of travel and services rendered in connection with the representation of this village at the said hearing in Albany New York.

RESOLUTION IN REFERENCE TO NEW YORK SENATE BILL #345,
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE SIX OF THE CONSTITUTION IN
RELATION OF ESTABLISHMENT OF A SIMPLIFIED STATE WIDE COURT
COURT SYSTEM.

Whereas, New York State Senate Bill #345 proposes the repeal and amendment of Article 6 of the Constitution relating to the establishment of a state-wide court system, and

Whereas, said Senate Bill #345 proposes, under Section 13 and 14, to abolish the magistrate court as it now exists in incorporated villages of this state, and,

Whereas, the proposed amendment to the Constitution would eliminate the presently constituted magistrates court as a part of the village government of the VILLAGE OF PALMYRA, WAYNE COUNTY NEW YORK, and,

Whereas, it is the opinion of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Palmyra that elimination of the office of the existing police justice court or magistrate court in said village would be detrimental to the best interests and general welfare of the Village of Palmyra and would create undue problems of law enforcement within said village and would cause undue hardship in the administration and enforcement of all local ordinances and local and state traffic laws,

THIS RESOLUTION is presented by Trustee Jeffery, and its adoption moved by Trustee Palmer, and duly seconded, that the office of Police Justice as provided under the Constitution of the State of New York must be preserved and retained in our village in its present form and status and with a minimum of the present jurisdiction as now established, and any proposal to alter or remove the office of Police Justice or Magistrate Court should be removed from the scope of the proposed amendment to the Constitution. The proposed revision of the court system should not include the existing magistrates courts or office of police justice as presently established and existing in our village government, and it is:

Wage Raise: W.D.Reich and Earl Hance from the highway dept.came before the Board to request an increase in wages from 1.70 to 1.75 per hour for equipment operators, starting 4/1/57.
