Paul Rubery:

Paul Rubery, Esq., Prospect Drive, commented that his property was not directly affected but advised that seven (7) years ago he appeared at the time of the rezoning of the Erie Canal, located behind the Palmyra Motors, West Main Street, to a C-3 area. This has, in his opinion, become a "Spot Zoning" area. area. This has, in his opinion, become a "Spot Zoning" area.
Because of the re-zoning of this spot, the Palmyra Motors, are now using it for retail purposes, and is not in keeping with the plans of the Historic Society for preservation by renovation of the Towpath Area. If this proposed Local Law is allowed to be adopted, it would be considered spot zoning at the corner of Vienna & Kent. In addition, he commented, both the Denosky & Herman property have frontages on Vienna and Main.
They, too, could ask for a variance to be allowed to have the area changed to C-3.

Nesbitt:

Henry B. Nesbitt, Esq., attorney for Irving Lazerson questioned of Mr. Rubery if he attached "historic significance" to this area (referring to the Lazerson request).

Rubery:

The west end of the village where the Aquaduct and Towpath are located, had historic value. Now because of the area zoned as it is, it will not be possible to have it restored.

Nesbitt:

Do you own property in this area (meaning, adjacent to the Lazerson property)?

Rubery:

No.

J. Cleason James Cleason, 440 Vienna, advised that he wished to submit a petition signed by neighbors in the area who object to a change. He commented that he had spoken to the Zoning Officer regarding many properties which have their rear areas adjoining property which is located in another zoned section. Some of these areas have junk cars, and could be classified as "spot zoning". Vienna Street, itself, has been residential for many years.

R. Trowbridge, corner Howell and Vienna, commented that he had been there since 1959. If this proposed local law is allowed to be adopted, other back yards would or could be allowed to become commercial.

J.Collins: John Collins, 421 Vienna Street, commented that when Pulcini installed the car wash, he placed a fence up so that motorcycles, etc. could not get through.

Wilson:

Trustee Wilson questioned if all the people here are those who live within the immediate neighborhood.

Response: Yes.

Nesbitt:

Attorney Nesbitt interjected that going back some ten years at the time the Urban Renewal Plan began, it would appear that a line seems to bisect these lots. The scale does not work out on the map. It all depends on where you want to measure. It is impossible to determine where C-3 & R-1 is. Mr. Lazerson has been a businessman for years.

Lazerson: Irving Lazerson, Hyde Park, owner of property at the corner of Kent and Vienna, questioned where the line of residential and commercial is actually located.

Cable TV: Dr. Alwin Hahnel, representative of Information Transfer, Inc., outlined the need for the rate increase. Dr. Hahnel advised

addit. Benefit: HBO:

outlined the need for the rate increase. Dr. Hahnel advised that the investors have not received any dividends. In addition, Sylvania, to whom they are indebted, are asking for the \$850,000. payment. It has not been possible to even meet expenses. Franchises have been more than doubled in the last three (3) years. The present rate of \$7.00 per home would need at least 5,000 subscribers, and there are only some 3,200 subscribers. To break even, a rate of \$11.00 per subscriber per month would be levied. Dr. Hahnel continued that to increase the number of subscribers, they are planning to offer to the public Home Box Office type of movies. These movies, he advised, would be uncut, with no commercials. In order to have this type of movie in the home, it would be necessary to subscribe to another device or mechanism to be attached to the cable. Dr. Hahnel informed the group that there would be a basic charge

Dr. Hahnel informed the group that there would be a basic charge for the installation for "descrambling".

The prime reason, he reiterated, for the increase, is to meet the debt of some \$850,000.

Asked Dr. Hahnel if there has been an increase in the present type of cable T.V. for installation. Trustee Wilson:

Replied that they have not. It would be their desire to be able to give a better rate for senior citizens, but they cannot do this according to the F.C.S. regulations. Hahnel:

Trustee Green:

Is there a discount to the annual payment?

Yes. The Palmyra area is generally good for reception and only about 40% of this area are subscribers. Basically, the overhead Dr. Hahnel Yes. remains the same.

H. Van-Is Information Transfer obligated to continue if the board does Etten: not approve of the rate increase?

Dr. Hahnel Replied that they will sponsor an advertising campaign to get more subscribers and try to push HBO. The overhead for this extra service, he continued, would not be excessive.

When Information Transfer first installed the Cable, they must have had some idea or feeling as to the number of potential sub-H. Van-Etten: scribers they could expect.

Commented that the Village of Palmyra has a contract with Cable Mayor Davin: T.V. for a 3% utility tax but we have only received 1%.

Dr. Hahnel That is correct, but the state takes 2% and the Village of Palmyra received the other 1%. Village should receive full 3%, and will arrange for this in the future.

Questioned if the increase will be levied to all subscribers. Churchill He further questioned if it would be possible to remove the home T.V. tax.

Dr. Hahnel Trying to eliminate.

Vouchers: Motion by Trustee Reeves, 2nd by Trustee Wilson and carried, the vouchers in the amount of \$72,190.91 were approved for payment, and treasurer authorized to issue checks in this amount.

Budget:

On motion by Trustee Reeves, 2nd by Trustee Wilson and carried, the Village Budget for the fiscal year 6/1/77-5/31/78 in the amount of \$345,000.00 to be raised by taxation based on the assessment of \$18,803,871 would levy a tax rate of \$18.35 per thousand. Unanimously approved.

P.Rubery Paul Rubery, Esq., attorney for Frederick Trowbridge and his wife, Carol, asked the board for a resolution relative to the property Prospect owned by Carol Trowbridge, formerly Estate of Preston Cochran at #388 Prospect Drive, which is located on the south side of Prospect on the incline side of Prospect Hill, owned by the Village of Palmyra. Position of house faces north-westerly with the northwest corner of the house barely three (3) feet from the boundary line of Prospect Park or Hill.

Lease w/Fair Assoc.: Mayor Davin advised that she had attended the board meeting of the Wayne County or Palmyra Agricultural Fair Society at which time the matter of a lease agreement between the Village of Palmyra and the Fair Association for the construction of a building to be known as a Community Center on property of the Fair Association, was discussed. Mayor Davin indicated that the Fair Association Board would approve of a lease.

Johnson Letter:

Trustee VanBortel advised that Clerk Otte had written a letter to Clyde Johnson, Hathaway Place, relative to the water line. Johnson, Trustee VanBortel advised, called to say that the letter did not indicate what he proposed. Johnson informed Trustee VanBortel that he was interested in having only the area from the curb box to the village main lowered and he in turn would lower his line. Trustee VanBortel indicated that he would delve into the matter further.

Envir. Review:

THE WAYNE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS have prepared a Local Law relative to preserving the quality of the environment in the County of Wayne. Article 14 indicated that unless a local agency had previously, before the public hearing of the county and final adoption of said local law, approved of its own local law relative to environment, that local agency, municipality, would automatically fall under the jurisdiction of the county. Public Hearing for County is scheduled for April 21, 1977 at 2:00 P.M.

Letter received from the Town of Palmyra advised that Harold In. of Pal. Wat. Kruger has been appointed by the Town of Palmyra as custodian Inspect.: of the water transmission lines in the four town districts.

Apprec. Letter:

L. Ziegler Louis Ziegler informed the board by letter that he wished to inform the board that through the quick cooperation and help of Hiram VanEtten, a disastrous flooding problem in their home was averted when the washing machine would not shut off. Village Clerk's office was called which in turn called Mr. Van Etten, who personally went to Ziegler's home to turn the water

K.Woodward re: Storm Drains:

Kenneth Woodward, Consulting Engineers, Webster, New York, N.Y. discussed with the board the storm sewer problems, especially in the vicinity of East Jackson, Prospect Drive and Fayette Street area. Mr. Woodward advised that he would send copies of his recommendations within the next two weeks. He commented that the drainage facilities have just been added to during the years and the problems have increased or built up due to the construction of houses, paving of the street, sanitary sewer installation. He advised that he and Ray Smith had gone over the area but would like to have an opportunity to meet personally with the people who live in the area and who have been experiencing the actual problems. Three reasons are apparent: (1) Rate of runoff: - As streets have been improved and buildings built, curbs, new driveways, parking facilities - - all have caused an added volume of water. (2) Some of the flooding is due to the clogging of inlets, roots, leaves, etc. Most of the storm sewers are very old. grew up, like Topsy, and do not have the carrying capacity. Just (3) Condition of Spring Brook has cut down the volume of water, due to the vegetation on the sides. The ends at the low point - south of Jackson & Fayette - - a 15" storm sewer runs 500 feet before it drops into Spring Brook. The lower floor elevation of the newest house in this area is only two and one half (22) feet above Spring Brook.

Recommend: How to Improve: (1) Rebuild several inlets so they are lower in relation to the Use gratings with wider openings of Fabricated pavement surface. Metal.

Installation of two small storm sewers which would dis-(2) charge into the Creek rather than onto the street. This would mean obtaining easements from property owners on Fayette Street on the east side south of Prospect Drive and north of Walker Street.

Cuyler Street and East Jackson Street Area. Village crews could do this if the board should so decide. Fayette Street area some \$4,500. and for Cuyler and East Jackson the cost would be \$9,000.00, if this were contracted out.

Cost:

Storm Drains (Cont'd) The complete solution would involve substantial expenditures. Woodward felt that the first project should be the grade of the culvert together with the widening of Spring Brook. He advised that the culvert should be wider in relation to the height and should be self-cleaning.

Major

Mayor Davin asked if it would be necessary to do the above major Constr.: construction if new culverts were built, to which Mr. Woodward replied, "Yes".

Eventual cost, he added would be some \$100,000 to \$200,000. for an overall replacement of culverts. It might be possible to obtain a Federal Grant. In any event, it would be necessary to have preliminary plans, which would be established. Raymond Smith, Highway Foreman, interjected that the drain is barely a foot deep now.

Board thanked Mr. Woodward and Ray Smith fortheir comments.

Gas & Elec .: On motion by Trustee VanBortel, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried, the New York State Electric & Gas Corp. was given permission to break the surface of Washington Street in two areas for the purpose of performing Cathodic Protection work on the gas facilities.

Water Tank:

Hiram VanEtten submitted a card from N. Dennis Means, P.E. in Webster who had informed Mr. VanEtten previously that it would be possible to obtain 100% funding for the construction of an extra pre-stressed concrete water tank for storing of filtered water. Clerk asked to write him for further details.

Village Barn:

Board discussed possible means of offering a bid on a vacant ware-house for use of village barns. Building is located in the Town of Palmyra but adjacent to the Garlock Factory. Bord felt a purchase offer might be in order.

Beautif. Cliff Williams, Wayne County Planning Board, talked with the board Project: relative to possible means of assessing the merchants for their share of the beautification project. The amount of the merchants share is some \$70,000. It would be possible for each merchant to make a single payment or by a ten year financing method.

Mr. Williams suggested that 90% could be based on assessment and 10% could be based on lot size. Attorney Poyzer explained the formula devised. decide how the \$70,000. is to be allocated. The board must Mr. Williams advised that the cost of the storm drain came to \$62,300, the lights, \$5,700, which totals some \$68,000. Each merchant could be assessed \$7.91/M - - - the 10% balance would be \$1.15/M.

General discussion followed relative to various assessments and a better way of equalizing the cost to each merchant.

For Sale Former Fun. Home:

Mayor Davin advised that a letter had been received from Mrs. Eva Mate, wife of Sherwood W. Mate, former funeral director, who commented that the property at 122 Cuyler Street was for sale at a price of \$50,000. Board agreed that Village was not in a position to negotiate for the piece of property and letter should be written to Mrs. Mate to thank her for her offer.

Steel Flag Pole:

Mayor Davin informed the board that she had received a letter from a Mr. Theodore, Jr., who in 1968 had urged that the American Flag be flown 24 hrs. per day. Letters had been sent to ten residents in the immediate vicinity but only Mrs. Lucille Clark, 226 Fayette Street, appeared to express her views on the matter.

Mrs. Clark advised that since the apartments have been built, her backyard fills with water, during and after a rain. Her sump pump in the basement runs constantly. When the developer built the

buildings, the creek, she continued, was re-routed.

Tr.Ree Trustee Reeves, who resides at 220 Fayette Street, interjected that the grating must be kept clean. As soon as village crews remove the debris, during a heavy rain, the watersubsides by flowing down the creek.

K. Woodward:

Mr. Woodward informed the board that the elevation of Jackson Street is only one (1) foot higher than the creek bed. He commented that he would like to look closer at the trash grates to ascertain if it would be possible to build the grates in such a fashion to allow the water to flow more readily but contain the brush, boards, sticks, leaves that seem to accumulate.
